For the information of the many former New Bernians now residing in Wilmington, we mentioned a few days ago the probable death sickness of poor John Kins, a well known character of the town for the past half century at least. The Journal says he died on Saturday night last, and that his funeral would take place on Sunday, from the Presbyterian Church.

There is law against cruelty to animals, but it is very seldom indeed that we hear of its being enforced. It has got to be such a common thing to see the poor dumb brutes treated with a shameful disregard of feeling that it has almost ceased to attract attention. If there ever was a case which should call for a speedy application of the penalty it is that of a colored man who works an old ox with a sore back. People on Market street were horrified a day or two since to see the way in which the poor animal was treated by its inhuman master. The ox must have naturally been in great pain from its scathed and bleeding back, added to which the man gave it frequent whacks across the wounded parts with his stick, causing the poor brute to literally tremble from the intensity of the pain which it was suffering. We hope some effort will be made by the proper authorities to put a stop to such brutality. This is no isolated occurrence, but one only of many instances that daily shock the feelings of those gifted with a touch of humanity.

The Charlotte Election. From a gentleman just arrived from Charlotte we learn that the municipal election at that place ended Monday in the election of Col. Wm. Johnston, the chronic office-seeking Liberal Republican, as Mayor, defeating Maxwell, regular Democratic nominee and present incumbent, and Col. Vail, Independent Democrat. Johnston's plurality was 41, the vote being as follows: Johnston... 646. Maxwell... 605. Vail... 158.

This was the natural result of the candidacy of Col. Vail. Maxwell offered to compromise so as to prevent Johnston's election, but Vail would listen to no proposition. With him it was "rule or ruin."

Mr. Stacey VanAmringe, Jr., sails on the British barque Susan L. Campbell, Captain Steele, which cleared from this port yesterday, for Liverpool. He will remain in Europe during the summer, visiting all the most interesting points, but will make his headquarters principally at London and Liverpool. The trip is made with the hope that it will materially benefit his health. The barque will probably not go to sea under a day or two.

SEVERAL AND MARINE. We stated a few days since that the steamer A. P. Hurt had changed hands. The new proprietors are Messrs. Woody & Currie, of this city, and Capt. W. S. Robinson and Mr. W. S. Cook, of Fayetteville. With the boat goes all the rights and franchise of the Cape Fear and People's Steamboat Company, including the warehouses and wharf property in Fayetteville. Capt. Robinson is to have command of the boat. Messrs. Woody & Currie are to act as agents of the steamer here and Mr. Cook at Fayetteville. The mate, pilot, and other employees will be retained for the present. The boat left for Fayetteville yesterday afternoon on her first trip under the new management. We wish the new owners much success, and we also extend our best wishes to Capt. Albert Worth in his retirement from the position he has held so long as commander of the A. P. Hurt.

The Atlantic Coast Line.

The managers of the Atlantic Coast Line of railway have accomplished their long desired wish of purchasing and getting control of the important link, which was wanting to complete an all-line rail to the North and the shortest route to Florida. The purchase of a controlling interest in the Richmond, Fredericksburg and Potomac Railroad was effected last Friday by Mr. W. T. Walters, of Baltimore; a majority of the stock having, as we understand, been purchased at 80. The road is eighty miles long, and formerly connected at Aquia creek with the Potomac steamers. Since the building of the line from Alexandria to Quantico, ten or twelve years ago, however, the Potomac steamers have not been regularly used, and through travel and business went by rail via the Richmond & Fredericksburg road. The acquisition of this important link, therefore, completes the coast line system broken from the South up to Quantico, thirty miles south of Washington, where they connect with the Pennsylvania Railroad, with which they are in entire harmony and have the most intimate interchange of relations. The acquisition also completes the line from the great lakes and New York to Tampa, Florida, on the Gulf of Mexico, from which point the new line to Havana by steamers will depart, making the shortest possible line. To both the Pennsylvania Railroad Company and the Coast Line the control of the eighty miles link just acquired is an important consideration.

The Atlantic Coast Line is composed now of the Richmond, Fredericksburg & Potomac, the Richmond & Petersburg, the Petersburg, the Wilmington & Weldon, the Wilmington, Columbia & Augusta, and the Northeastern Railroads and connecting lines. Mr. Harry Walters, of Baltimore, is general manager of all these lines. The system is being extended and strengthened at different points, and is the most profitable and one of the most important in the South. What may be deemed an important consideration to the people of Wilmington is the fact that the purchase of the connecting link will effectually do away with all necessity for the present of extending what is known as the "short cut" from Fayetteville to Florence. This much we learned in an interview with one of the officials yesterday.
