Postal Affairs-An Enterprising To bacco Dealer Complained of by the Trade-Removals for Offensive Partisanship-A Postoffice Burned-Navy Paymaster Smith to be Courtmartialed-A Defaulter Arrested, &c.

(By Telegraph to the Morning Star.) Washington, June 16.-A number of tobacco dealers have complained to the Postoffice Department that a tobacco firm in Ohio is conducting a gift enterprise, in offering to distribute \$30,000 around to consumers of its tobacco, in prizes graded in proportion to the amount consumed, as shown by the presentation of a number of tin labels that are affixed to each plug. The business has grown so rapidly that other dealers in tobacco have combined to employ counsel for the prosecution of the case before the Postoffice Department, with a view to having the advertising circulars and tags of the objectionable concern excluded from the mails. The matter is under consideration at the Postoffice De-

The report of the Court of Inquiry in the case of Paymaster General Joseph A. Smith, Chief of the Bureau of Provisions and Clothing, Navy Department, was made public to-day. It relates in detail the facts and circumstances in regard to the purchases of beef and pork and summarizes the conclusions of the Court as follows: 1st, That Paymaster General Smith has been derelict and negligent in his duty and culpably inefficient in the performance thereof. 2d, That he has, to the detriment and pecuniary loss Brown in his orders and contracts. 3rd. That he has violated the laws regulating the dutles and responsibilities of his office and that these violations were to the detriment of the government. 4th. That he has been in many ways unfaithful to the trust imposed on him by his office. 5th. That the mildest interpretation that the court can put on his acts is ignorance of his legal responsibilities and duties, gross neglect of his duties, and indifference and inefficiency in the performance of them. The Secretary of the Navy has decided to order court-martial for the trial of Paymaster General

MADRID, June 16.—In the province of Castellon De La Plana, yesterday, there were eighty cases of cholera and sixty deaths. Thirty thousand people have fied from the province of Murcia. In the city of Murcia alone yesterday there were, according to the latest returns, sixty-four fresh cases of cholera and thirty-nine deaths. In the province of Murcia, outside of the city, there were fifty cases of cholera and sixteen deaths. and sixteen deaths, within the same period. The Official Gazette confirms the statement that cholera is raging in the provinces of Valencia, Castellon, De La Plana, and Murcia, and in the city of Madrid. The opposition newspapers, on the contrary, deny that cholera exists in Madrid, and say that all testimony regarding suspicious cases is insufficient to give warrant for the assertion that they are cases of cholera.


