WASHINGTON. Cotton Exports - Presidential and Fourth-Class Postmasters Appointed - Action of Civil Service Commission in Regard to Wetmore at New York, etc.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12. - The Chief of the Bureau of Statistics reports that the exports of domestic cotton for the United States during the month of October, 1896, and during the three months ended October 31, 1896, as compared with the corresponding periods of the preceding year were as follows: Total for October, 1,868,607,921 bales; value, \$30,300,164. Total for October, 1894, 1,863,421 bales, value, \$32,238,292. Total for three months ending October 31, 1896, 5,729,919 bales, value, \$89,884,144. Total for three months ending October 31, 1894, 5,713,128 bales, value, \$87,777,788.

PENNSYLVANIA. A Firm Proposed in Pittsburgh - Serious Trouble Anticipated. By Telegram to the Morning Star. LOUISIANA. Confession of a Murderer in the State Penitentiary. By Telegram to the Morning Star. NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 12. - An interview with ex-Recorder Thomas J. Ford, now in the penitentiary, was published this afternoon. In it he confesses that it was he, and not his brother "Pat" Ford, that killed police constable Murphy. He said: "I fired two shots before he fell, and he was not exactly down after the first two shots were fired. As I reached him I fired the last shot, but how many I was so excited I cannot tell."
