FROM ALL PARTS OF THE WORLD FORTY-NINTH CONGRESS.

FIRST SESSION. The Education Bill Amended and Passed by the Senate—Appropriation Bills Passed.

WASHINGTON, March 5.—The Senate, after some unimportant preliminary business, took up the Education bill.

The amendment offered by Mr. Logan was the Interior is provided that the Secretary of the Interior shall have the proper administration of this law through the Commissioner of Education.

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NEW YORK. The Car-Drivers' Strike—A Victory for the Drivers—Holland, the Texan, Acquitted of the Murder of Davis.

New York, March 5.—Railroad Commissioner O'Donnell, after his consultation with the executive committee of the Empire Association, took a cab and went over to Brooklyn, where he met President Richardson at the office of the Atlantic Avenue Mutual Protection Association.

Resolved, That the Atlantic Avenue Road of Brooklyn will agree to pay men at the rate of \$3 per day for twelve hours as a day's work for conductors and drivers, including half an hour allowed for dinner, and after our cars are running to submit all questions of difference between employers and employees to Commissioner O'Donnell.

On receiving this document Commissioner O'Donnell at once returned to New York and went to the Central Labor Union hall, on East Eighth street, where the executive committee of directors, who had submitted the proposition to them and it was accepted promptly.

Down stairs in the large hall the strikers were in session. The terms of agreement were announced amid a breathless hush in the room. When finished, a man threw his hat up and a yell broke out which shook the building. The meeting broke up and the men started for work.

Joseph O'Donnell, of the Striker's Committee, said in a report: "All the surface roads will start at 2 p. m. The proposition from Richardson was accepted. Commissioner O'Donnell will be arbitrator, and we accept the choice. It is a great victory for us."

Union Assembly No. 2,878, of the First Local District Assembly, No. 75, is the name of the branch of Knights of Labor which includes all organizations or local assemblies of railroad men in New York and Brooklyn.

Other amendments of detail were made, on motion of Messrs. Edmunds, Evar, Hale, Dolph, Blair, Ingalls, Teller, Eustis, Logan, Hampton and Conger.

The bill having thus been perfected as in Committee of the Whole, it was reported to the Senate and most of the amendments made in Committee of the Whole were agreed to.

On motion of Mr. George the section setting forth that the duty of the school is not to establish an independent school system in the States, but only to extend aid to State governments was restored by a unanimous vote.

Mr. Plumb read some articles from the New York Evening Post that since the agitation of the question of national aid States of the South had not put forth their usual efforts for education.

The bill was then read a third time and passed; Yeas 36, nays 11. A number of pairs were announced, owing to the necessary absence of some Senators. The vote in detail is as follows: Yeas—Gray, Hale, Call, Colquitt, Conger, Cullop, Dolph, Eustis, Evans, George, Gibson, Hoar, Jackson, Jones of Arkansas, Keena, Logan, Mahone, Mansfield, Miller of Ohio, Mitchell of Oregon, Morrill, Palmer, Payne, Pugh, Ransom, Riddleberger, Sawyer, Spooner, Vance, Van Wyck, Voorhees, Wall, and Wilson of Iowa.

Nays—Cochran, Frye, Gray, Hale, Harris, Ingalls, Jones of Nevada, Maxey, Plumb, and Wilson of Maryland.

Immediately on the passage of the bill, Mr. Edmunds moved for the adjournment reported by him from the Judiciary Committee, expressing the sense of the Senate on the refusal of the Attorney General to send to the Senate copies of papers called for by resolution of January 23rd, 1886, (the Dusk papers).

Mr. Edmunds inquired if consideration of those resolutions would continue until they should be disposed of.

Mr. Edmunds replied that he hoped it would so continue, but hoped it would be disposed of in two or three days. Mr. Edmunds remarked that he would not ask to take up the case on the floor after the morning hour. Mr. Edmunds' motion was agreed to.

The Urgent Deficiency Appropriation bill and the Invalid Pension Appropriation bill were received in the Senate and referred to the Committee on Appropriations. The Senate then, at 6:15 p. m., adjourned till Monday next.
