BURGLAR CAUGHT.

A Culored Man Helleved to be the Perpetrator of Several Robberies. Policemen Smith, Howell] and Grant esptured a colored man Wednesday night, who in all probability is the mysterious robber who has recently plundered several small stores in Brooklyn and other parts o

The officers discovered the man attempting to break into the dress-making rooms of Mrs. Ames, on Fourth near Hanover street. He had succeeded in foreing open one of the shutters with a large crow-bar, and was attempting to raise the windowsash. When he saw the officers approaching he dropped the crow-bar and ran. After eluding his pursuers, however, he returned to the place, probably to get the crow-bar, when the policemen caught him, carried him to the city prison; and had him

locked up The fellow gives his name as Henry Lewis, and says that he is from Brooklyn, N. Y.; that he came to Wilmington some time during the latter part of last December. He claims to be a machinist and brick mason by trade, but says that he has done no work since his arrival in Wilmington. He is a tall black fellow, wears a moustache, and was dressed when captured in s long dark overcoat and cap.

Search warrants were issued yesterday. and at a house which Lewis had frequented a number of articles of common jewelry were found that were identified as the property of Ben Scott, colored, whose store was broken open and robbed on the night of the 3d of January. Scott also identified as his property the coat that Lewis had on, and which was also taken from his store when the place was robbed.

Yesterday afternoon, a colored man named Pat Willis called at the city prison. where Lewis is confined, and identified the latter as a man who went over the river to Willia' home in Brunswick county last Saturday night. The man had a doublebarrelled gun and two pistols, which he offered to sell. The Sunday following, Willis says, an attempt was made to break into the store of Mr. Robbins on the Brunswick side of the ferry. The proprietor of the store was awakened by the noise made by the burglar, and saw a man trying to break open a window, but before he could get his pistol the fellow found out that he had aroused Mr Robbins and made his

The gun that Lewis offered for sale is supposed to be one that was stolen from Mr. Cameron's store, on Third and Castle street, a few aights before the robbery of

The Murderer Bingham.

Officials of the New York institution for Deaf Mutes are reported as expressing the belief that Bingham, the murderer of Miss Turlington, is dead, and by suicide. There is conjecture that a very tall man who recently killed himself, by jumping from Ningara suspension bridge, was Bingham. A report in the New York Herald says:

About a week ago Ernest Bingham, Walter's younger brother, 16 years old, called upon Superintendent Brainerd to seek information as to his brother. No sooner had he been told about the extraordinary conduct of his brother than Ernest express ed the conviction that he was insane. He said that a couple of years ago, after leaving the deaf and dumb asylum, Walter was injured on the head in a railway accident in North Carolina, and that since that

time he had not be n in his right mind. When Ernest Bingham left the deaf and dumb asylum in Carmansville he was accompanied by one of the deaf mute inspectors of the institution, who went with him to the Hotel St. George, at Broadway and Twelfth street. Here he left young Bingham, whose name does not appear on the hotel's register, and whose presence there at any time was not known by the clerks. It is evident, therefore, that the brother of the deaf mute, as well as the fugitive from justice himself, has reasons for retirement. The three hundred or more inmates of the asylum at Carmansville are profoundly agitated over the North Carelina tragedy, and in their mysterious finger conversations bazard all manner of theories upon the guilt or innocence of Bingham. Buperintendent Brainerd thinks that some of them kdow more than they are willing to reveal .

Fish Dying Along the Coast.

The beach along the coast from Lockwood's Folly south, for miles, is reported to be covered with dead fish thrown up by the waves, and in such vast numbers that the farmers are hauling them off to be composted for manure. The same strange phenomenon was reported last week along the coast from Scott's Hill to Topsail. where tons of the dead fish were brought across the Sound in boats and hauled off by the farmers for manure. The dead fish are all of the variety known as fat-backs or menhaden, and are valuable for fertili zing purposes.

Capt. Hubbard, of the steamer Planter, plying between Charleston and Georgetown, S. C., says that the beach for thirty miles along the coast of that State, between Pawley's Island and Little River, is covered with dead fish-so thickly covered that the sand cannot be seen Millions of them are lying on the shore. They were first discovered, he says, on Wednesday, the 29th of December.

Smithville's Railroad Project.

The good people of Smithville, also, are somewhat agitated on the railroad question It is reported that some of the officials connected with the proposed railroad from that place to some point in Tennessee, have already made their domicile there and have rented the Pavilion, which is to be transformed into offices for their use. The railroad wharves are to be built in front of the hotel. And the name of the town is to be changed to Southport.

OPERA HOUSE.

Mendelssohn Quintette Club.

No better evidence of the high appreciation of this time-honored organization in our city could have been given than by the large assembly which gathered at the Opera House last night. Despite the heavy storm of wind and rain there was a full house. The annual visits made by this company to Wilmington have made them appear as friends and acquaintances with whom we meet once a year and discuss delicious morsels of music and song, and their night is looked forward to by many with pleasurable anticipation.

The concert was opened by Schubert's Octette, in F, Op. 166, arranged as a quintette, and it seemed as if the performers desired to impress the andience at the star with the wonderful facility and ease with which they rendered this delightful and difficult composition. They certainly succeeded in doing so, and the storm of applause which was awarded them doubtless put them en rapport with their listeners and on their mettle.

Miss Alice Ryan sang an old Italian air as a sample of the music composed in the seventeenth century, which was heartily enjoyed and enthusiastically encored. There is a sweetness and pathos embodied in this old music which is peculiarly attractive, especially to students and lovers of music, of which there were many present, and this old song was warmly welcomed.

No. 3 was a flute solo by Mr. William Schade, which was another proof that each performer is a perfect master of his instrument. His efforts elicited a very decided encore and he favored the lovers of popular music by rendering "The Mocking

The great feature of the evening was undoubtedly Beethoven's Quartette in C mi nor. It is on this style of music that this club bases its high reputation, and, as usual, it was played perfectly.

It was a morsel for the gods-the almost divine thoughts and emotions of the great master were fully realized, and the result was a taste of the greatest, purest and best music ever written by man. The Andantino was inexpressibly beautiful Its slow. grand, soulful theme thrilled every heart and kept every listener spell-bound The fifth number was a violin solo by

Mr. John Marquardt. He possesses a fine instrument and knows how to use it. His tones were full and round and perfectly pitched. He played with remarkable ease and fluency. Like his predecessors he was recalled, and as good naturedly responded. The genial face of Mr. Thos. Ryan,

with his clarionette, is like that of an old friend, and his solo was greatly enjoyed. As a specimen of lighter music, the Quintette played two very catching little pieces. a love song by Taubert, and Schuster's "Adieu to Naples." They were little gems and were well received.

Mr Louis Blumenberg followed with a violincello solo, and made a great hit, as was evidenced by the ovation he received. Foste's "Good Bye" was a little too much for Miss Ryan. It requires a voice of an unusually large register, and while the song was on the whole, well rendered. the lower notes were not full enough. This young lady has made rapid improvement since her last appearance here and is quite an addition to the company.

The concert closed with Boccherini's minuel, and there was a sigh of regret, as it terminated this delightful entertainment

The large and fashionable audience were enthusiastic and the tributes accorded to the club were many and deserved. The ears of all were tickled and their fancies gratified by the beautiful strains of music which greeted them. The entire performance was most unique in all particulars, and everything combined to make it most pleasant for the audience and the entire

The club will always be welcomed here with pleasure and will always receive a most cordial welcome.
