The through train from the west will leave Rutherfordton at 6 a. m. and arrive in Wilmington at 8 p. m. Turpentine Distillers.

The Naval Stores Manufacturer's Protective Association, of Georgia, have issued circulars to distillers in which they urge a prudent and conservative policy in the matter of cutting boxes for the next season. The writer has waited patiently and modestly for some one more competent to give the anxious Bran a reply to this oft propounded inquiry in connection with the Cape Fear & Yadkin Valley Railroad Fearing disastrous results may follow un-less this protracted anxiety is relieved, I endeavor feebly to reply and allay in a small measure the terrible strain under which your valuable daily appears to la-

We must proceed cautiously in this important investigation, and study the unture of the bivalve alluded to before we decide positively. The clam is not a bad character, and in some things we might wish to resemble him. In the first place, it is worthy of note, though possessed of a large tongue a clam never refers to a neighbor who happens to differ from him as a periwinkle or other inferior species of shellfish. This moderation commands our respect. Like many a good man in this good city, the clam has a deep-rooted leve for real estate, and is attached to his home. The clam endeavors to keep his home free from barnacles, and the citizen wishes to have his home with as few of the barnacles of taxation as is consistent with good government.

Should a syndicate of crabs propose set tling a colony of barnacles on the clam without adequate compensation or benefit objection would be made The citizen clam objects seriously to increased taxation unless commensurate advantage be gained. Among the thousands who, it is claimed, are so anxious to vote \$150,000 to the Cape will invest their private funds in the stock of that company at par? Is there one man in the community not identified with the bonds of the company who will invest his money in said stock at ten cents on the dollar? Why is not the sauce for the municipal goose savory for the citizen gander? Simply because he sees no dividend machine connected with the institution. The gulf fixed between the bondholder and stockholder is so great that nothing will ever pass from thence to these. When the thoughtful, well regulated clam sees the great disparity between voters and invest-

ors he meditates deeply, Doubtless your readers are familiar with what are known as mud-suckers. These are the remains of incautious clams who have taken in all the scum investments and badly watered stocks that offer. They should be warnings to us. From his natural position the clam can see how straws float (see STAR 18th instant). Citizens can see the straws and the bricks and put them together, though, unfortunately, many of us get "bricks without straw.

Clams will soon be more plentiful. In about sixty days the county of New Hanover (from a tax-payer's point practically the city of Wilmington) will probably vote \$100,000 for the railroad to New River. If to that he added \$150,000 for the Cape Fear & Yadkin Valley Railroad Company-a reasonable mileage on the name would pay something-we increase our indebtedness one quarter of a million dollars This is a serious matter, or should be.

I note with regret that application will be made to the Legislature for authority to put the question of this donation of \$150,000 to the people direct, without passing through the ordinary channel of the city govern-ment. This is a dangerous precedent, and it appears unnecessary. If the large majority of tax-payers are in favor of the donation, let them month after next elect aldermen to carry out their views.


