The Cholera in Buenos Avres.

From the weekly abstract of sanitary reports issued by the Surgeon General of the United State Marine Hospital Service, Feb 1st, the following is taken:

The United States Minister, at Buenos Ayres, reports:

"The cholera is on a steady increase here and has assumed more deadly features. Thirty-six new cases were reported to the Board of Public Assistance of Buenos Avres yesterday, more than half of which died in a very few hours. The worst of all, lies in the fact of its rapid spread throughout the outside provinces. This dreadful disease, 'which walketh at night and wasteth at noonday, leaps the prudence of quarantine, and breaks down every line of military cordon. It is still raging flercely at Rosario, and has recently broken out at Cordoba, Tucuman, Zarati, Bahia, Blanco, and Azul, and, worse than that, has gained a footbold on the island of Martin Garcia, where 5,000 terrified immigrants are detained in quarantine, without sufficient food or shelter: We have great fears of
