Col. James H. Rion, a leading South Carolina lawyer, who died recently at Winnsboro, before his death, stated to his family and physician that he was a grandson of Louis XVI. of France, who was beheaded in the French Revolution. A special to the New York Star from Columbia, dated the 19th, gives this account as coming from the Colonel:

"That this boy, the Dauphin, who was reported to have died at an early age and to have been an imbecile, had not really died, but was sent to Canada and there had been reared under the name of De Rion; that he entered the English army and married Miss Hunter, Col. Rion's mother. De Rion died in Col. Rion's infancy, and he and his mother were placed under the charge of Mr. Calhoun by the Austrian Embassador at Washington with a statement of the facts and upon certain conditions. One of these was that Rion should never go to Europe unless in charge of the Austrian authorities and on an Austrian man-of-war, and further that he should never accept civil office in this country. These conditions were faithfully observed. The secret of his birth was told three years ago to Col. Rion's eldest daughter, who west to Europe to find out what she could about the Dauphin. Col. Rion had in his his possession a very valuable gold snuff box, set with diamonds on the top of which there is a monogram of the Orleans family wrought in diamonds. The snuff box was never exhibited to any of the Colonel's family until he was on his death bed.

Narrow Escape from Drowning. A sailor fell into the river Sunday night, and but for the praiseworthy and heroic efforts of William Crawford, an elderly

colored man, would have been drowned. Crawford is employed as a watchman at the warehouse of Mr. Sweet, on the wharf near the foot of Nun street, and while on duty Sunday night, between one and two o'clock heard a heavy splash in the water and a smothered cry for help. He realized at once that some one had fallen into the river, and ran to the place to render assistance. It was dark and the tide was low, but by stooping down he could disseern a man's head and a hand grasping the slippery timbers. They were beyond Crawford's reach, but seeing that as istance must be quickly given or the man would drown, he lowered himself over the edge of the wharf and told the man to grasp him by one leg and he would try and save him. The half-drowned sailor threw an arm around one of Crawford's legs and held on with a death grip, but with the other arm he still grasped the log, which he would not relinquish. Crawford was in great peril; the man was pulling him down into the water and his strength was nearly exhausted, when fortunately three sailors on the brig San Juan, lying some distance up the wharf, heard the colored man's cries for assistance and came to his aid. Even then it was a difficult matter to get the sailor to relinquish his hold of the log so that he could be hauled up, and it was only done by Crawford putting his foot on the man's arm and forcing

himto let go. The sailor proved to be intoxicated. H was one of the crew of the German barque Perdinand. He may thank his lucky stars that Crawford was near enough to hear his cry and ready to aid him, or he would have
