STREET RAILWAY.

Objectionable Features of the Charter Granted the Company-The Board of Aldermen will Apply for a Supplemental Act.

The Board of Aldermen met in called session at the City Hall at half-past ? o'clock yesterday. Mayor Hall and Aldermen Worth, Giles, Dudley, Bear, Boney and McEachern being present.

The Mayor stated that he had called the Board together to consider the charter recently granted by the Legislature for the construction of a street railway in the city-He said that his attention had been called to it by several gentlemen, with the suggestion that he should look into it, and for this purpose he went to Raleigh and obtained a copy of the bill. He said that there was no desire to impede the construction of a street railway. From time to time he had received letters from parties In Northern cities making isquiry as to the construction of a street railway, and his invariable reply to these parties was to come and see for themselves; that the Board of Aldermen would give every encouragement to such an enterprise. But the bill that had passed the Legislature he thought contained many objectionable features It divests the Board of its powers in the control of the streets of the city. and in no one instance does it refer to the city government. He suggested that a supplemental bill to correct these objectionable features in the charter could be gotten through the Legislature if the friends of the original bill will allow, and if not he would recommend that the Board make fight for its passage before surrendering jurisdiction.

Mr. Outlar, city attorney, read a certified copy of the bill, as follows:

The General Assembly of North Carolina

Section 1. That for the purpose of constructing, maintaining and operating street railways in the city of Wilmington for the transportation of freight and passengers, Isaac Bates, J. F. Divine, A. D. Brown, F. H. Stedman, W. H. Chadbourn, John D. Bellamy, Jr., and such other persons as they may associate with them, are hereby constituted a body politic and corporate under the name and style of "The Wilmington Street Railway Company," and by that name shall be entitled to sue and be sued, plead and be impleaded in any court in or out of the State of North Carolina, shall have and use a common seal, and alter the same at pleasure, may buy, sell and hold such real and personal estate as it shall deem proper, for the carrying on of the business hereinafter mentioned, may make contracts, establish bylaws for its government, and shall have, use and enjoy all other rights, powers and privileges, which by law belong to any and all other street

railway companies in this State. Sec. 2. That the said company is hereby authorized to make, construct, equip, maintain and operate lines of street railway with one or more tracks, and all necessary branches, turnouts and switches, using such motive power as shall be determined by the Board of Directors, through and along the streets within the corporate limits of the city of Wilmington and to points within the vicinity thereof, and erects such depots, stables, offices, shops, and other buildings as are necessary and proper for conducting the business of the said railway company, and to demand and receive such sums or sums of money for the carriage of passengers as the directors may think porper, not to exceed ten cents for each person, on any line within the corporate limits of said city, nor more than twenty-five (25) cents to points beyond the city limits; and if the directors shall determine to carry freight or parcels such compensation for these services as may be reasonable. Provided, that the tracks laid by the said company shall conform to the grade of the streets through which they pass and shall be so laid as to present no unnecessary obstacle to wagons or other vehicles turning in or crossing the street or road through or over which said railway may be laid, and shall at its own expense repair and put in as good condition as they were previous to the laying of the

track the streets through which the track may have been constructed. Sec. 3. The capital stock of said company shall be twenty five thousand dollars (\$25,-000) in shares of one hundred (\$100) each, and may be increased to a sum not exceeding one hundred and fifty thousand dollars \$150,000), whenever the Board of Directors shall so determine, and the company shall have the right to borrow money, to make, negotiate and dispose of its promissory notes, drafts or bonds, and to mortgage

any or all of its property or franchise to secure their payments. Whenever any lands may be Sec. 4. for such railways or any branches, the company shall have the power to have the same assessed and condemned for railway purposes in the manner prescribed in the Code of North Carolina, volume 1, chapter 49, section 1943 and the following sections; and the company shall be bound to keep up all the bridges and crossings, in good repair whenever the same shall be affected by

*Sec. 5. Said company shall be deemed fully organized upon the ratification of this acts and a majority of the corporators named in the first section may meet at any time thereafter, and that a President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer and not less than three nor more than nine directors issue stock, bonds and other securities, obtain subscriptions and enter into contracts for the construction and furnishing of their line or lines, depots and buildings; and to do all other lawful things they may consider necessary and proper to carry out the purposes of this act; and the said company shall have the exclusive right for a term of fifty years to construct and operate lines of street rallways in the city of Wilmington. Provided, work shall be begun on some one line thereof in five years after the

granting of this charter. Sec. 6 Any person who shall remove, obstruct, injure, deface, or destroy any part of said railways, cars, fixtures, machinery, property or structures of any kind, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and fined or imprisoned in the discretion of the court

Sec. 7. The conductors and other agents and servants of said company are hereby invested with the same authority, power and privileges which belong to similar officers and agents of railway companies now operating in this State.
Sec. 8. This act shall be in force from

and after it ratification. Alderman Worth asked if there was anything in the bill just read different from the charters granted for street railways in other cities of the State.

The charter of the Street Railway Comof Raleigh was cited as being similar, except that it provided that the railway shall be laid only on such streets as the Board of Aldermen may approve. It was further argued that an objectionable

feature was giving the company the exclusive right for fifty years. By doing a little work it could maintain its franchise and exclude others. It was thought, also, that the city should have the right not only to say on what streets railways should be laid, but also whether in the middle or on one side of the streets.

After a further interchange of views, Alderman Bear moved that the City Attorney be requested to draft a supplementel bill, embodying the views of the Board, to be presented at an adjourned meeting to be held Monday at 8 p. m. The Board then adjourned.

The Tileston School. The bearing of the children was exceedingly good throughout, and the order was perfect. All did well. At the close of the entertainment, the national airs of England, Scotland, Ireland and France were rendered and very well indeed for their years; the whole concluded with "Home, Sweet Home," the audience standing and some patticipating in the singing. Eternity alone will reveal the extent of the good that this excellent school-a most generous benefaction of a Northerner, Mrs. Hemenway-has done for Wilnington under the admirable management of Miss Bradley.

Richmond's Election.

Richmond county voted yesterday upon the question of subscription by the county to the capital stock of the South Atlantic & Northwestern Railroad Company-the road from Smithville to Bristol, Tenn. Advices from Laurinourg up to 3 p. m. state that the vote for "no subscription" at that place was 438. The total vote of the place is about 600, which it was thought would be cast before the close of the polls. The negroes were voting solidly with the whites, for the first time in their history. There was very strong opposition to "subscription" in Laurinburg.
