The Inter-State Commerce Law. Railroad men who have recently returned from the special meeting held in Washington last week, of the Southern Railway and Passenger Association, say that no definite understanding in regard to the Inter-State Commerce law was arrived at. Consideration of the matter was postponed until another meeting to be held shortly in Washington, when it is expected that some definite plan for complying with the law Thursday:

The Public Building. The government invites scaled proposals or the sale of property suitable for a site for the public building authorized to be erected in this city. Proposals will be received by Capt. C. D. Myers, deputy collector of Internal Revenue, at his office in the Custom House. The requirements as to dimensions are: If a corner lot, not less than 160 by 100 feet; if not a corner lot, not less than 200 by 105-the 200 feet to be street frontage. Buildings on the property selected are to be retained and removed by the owner.

The rumor in circulation several days ago that no steps would be taken this year towards the crection of a government building in this city, because of the failure of Congress to pass the General Deficiency bill, seems to have been false. At the time it was the impression of perfons conversant with such matters that the appropriation for Wilmington's public building was embraced in the Sundry Civil bill.

The Sundry Civil appropriation bill contained an amendment appropriating fifty thousand dollars for the purchase of a site and commencing work on the building to be erected in this city, and unless this amendment was left out by the conference committee it is incorporated in that bill.

Mr. Walter J. Hardy, Manager of the Sumter Base Ball Association, publishes the following letter which he received from Mr. H. M. Emerson, of this city, relative to the inter-State League:

"Please advise me as early as possible of the date you decide upon for holding the convention, and we will endeavor to have a delegate present. I note that the Columbis Association has had a meeting, and will go into the convention to limit the number of professionals employed by the different teams. While, as a matter of economy, I am in favor of such a motion, I would oppose it, as we endeavored to work it in the North Carolina League of 1885, but found it a very difficult matter to draw the line between a professional and amateur player. Wilmington will go in with as few paid players as possible; in fact will try to do entirely with home material, but we have no objection to other clubs employing as much foreign talent as they are able to pay for. If Augusta comes in we should have an amateur c'ub from Charleston, or one from Spartanburg or some other western South Carolina point."

The Drummers.

The decision of the Supreme Court of the United States in the drummers' case recently reported in the telegraph columns of the STAR, is generally regarded here as not being applicable to this State, but this view of the matter is questioned by some. As stated in the telegram, the decision is in effect that a man need pay no license for selling goods in any State, except the one in which he resides. The Tennessee law set aside by the Supreme Court was in force in but one district, but it was applicable to drummers coming into that district from other parts of Tennessee as well as from other States, and for this reason three of the eight justices dissent from the opinion of the Court.
