



DANGER IN ICE —In an article on "The Number of Bacteria in Ice" in the American Journal of Pharmacy for December, 1886, the author concludes that "the common 'raw' ice, till lately almost exclusively used, on account of the large number of bacteria, capable of development, which it contains, should not be taken with food, in drinks, or for medicinal purposes. It should never be used in the treatment of wounds. In these connections, artificial ice, made from distilled water, should be employed. The use of raw ice in contact with food, which is afterwards to be cooked, is permissible, but artificial ice is to be preferred. Raw ice may be freely used where it does not come into direct contact with food."
