The receipts for the week ended yesterday were 12,487, against 3,708 bales received the same week last year. The receipts yesterday were 2,335 bales.

Exports for the past week are 208 bales to domestic ports and 5,100 bales foreign. The total exports since September 1st are 8,010 bales.

The stock at this port is 19,265 bales: last year at same time it was 4,391 bales.
