The yacht Tarpon, which has been at the Hummocks for a short time past, cleared yesterday for St. Augustine, Florida.

The regular weekly meeting of the Young Men's Christian Association will be held this evening at 8.15 o'clock in the Library rooms.

The firm of Behrends & Munroe has been dissolved. The furniture business will be continued at the old stand by Mr. S. Behrends.

Messrs. DeRosset & Co. cleared yesterday the Nor. barque Hector, Johannesen, for Riga, Russia, with 3,742 barrels of rosin, valued at \$3,705.

The iron hull of the burned steamer Regulator, lying in the dock at the foot of Brunswick streets, was sold by auction yesterday.

The age of members is 20 years and upwards. Each Castle is permitted to determine the maximum age of applicants for membership.

The Proposed Tournament. A meeting of the Fireman's Tournament Committee was held last night at the hall of the Hook and Ladder Company.

The Cotton Bulletin report from the Signal Office gives the average temperature in this, the Wilmington district, at 86 degrees; in the city it was 83.

Rev. C. L. Arnold delivered the last of his series of sermons on the Ingersoll-Gladstone contention, at St. Paul's church Sunday night.

There were fine rains on the line of the Carolina Central, all the way from Rutherfordton to Wilmington, Sunday and Monday.

A Thief Caught. Walter Williams, a young colored fellow who has been dodging the police for a long time, was caught yesterday by Officer Burlington in the neighborhood of the W. C. & A. depot.

Knights of the Golden Eagle.

A circular from Mr. J. D. Barnes, Supreme Chief of the Knights of the Golden Eagle, Philadelphia, Pa., says that a Castle of this Order is being organized in Wilmington.

The Order is represented to be in successful operation in twenty-three States. It was founded in Baltimore, February 6th, 1873.

The ritualistic work consists of three degrees, viz: First, or Pilgrims; Second, or Knights; and Third, or Crusaders Degree.

The regalia of the Order consists of a badge worn upon the left breast. The age of members is 20 years and upwards.

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The committee appointed to solicit subscriptions to pay the necessary expenses of the tournament, (including \$300 to be invested in prizes) reported that they had succeeded in securing subscriptions to the amount of \$420.

It was decided by the full committee that, in view of the fact that one thousand dollars will be required to pay the expenses of the tournament, the committee on subscription be directed to make another effort to raise the full amount.
