One of Porter's beer wagons was standing in front of the Diamond Saloon on Front street, and as the runaway passed, the horse took fright and dashed up the street. Turning into Princess street the beer wagon upset and the boxes of beer were thrown out, the wagon smashed and the horse injured, one of his hind legs being cut.

A large scow built at Skinner's ship-yard for the Alabama Dredging Company was launched yesterday morning.

The First Ward Democratic Club will meet to-night at 8.15 o'clock in Brooklyn Hall. No meeting was held last night.

The little child of Mrs. Andrews knocked down by a horse on McRae street late Monday afternoon was not seriously injured.

South Carolina is supplying this market to a large extent with water melons. The crop there is over-abundant while here it is short.

There was some talk a short time ago of a company being formed here to manufacture cotton bagging for baling cotton, but the matter was finally dropped.

The sidewalks in many parts of the city are sadly in need of attention. Many of them are pools of standing water and mud-puddles after every rain.

Burglars made a raid Monday night upon the kitchen of the Misses Brown, on Seventh and Mulberry streets, and carried off all the provisions they could find.

Newspaper thieves are a great annoyance at other places than Wilmington. In Savannah, two colored boys caught taking papers from piazzas were lodged in jail on the charge of larceny. The capture and punishment of one or more of the thieves here might teach the rest a salutary lesson.

The white founding mentioned in yesterday's STAR is still in the keeping of Mary Fillyaw, the colored woman who found the infant on her piazza Saturday night. She has had several applications for it, but is unwilling to give it up. One of the applicants was a young married white woman, who wanted to adopt the child.

Obadiah and John. Advice from Florence, S. C., confirm the sorrowful intelligence received here a day or two ago that the two distinguished citizens named above are in jail at that place. It is said that on their arrival in Florence they went into a bar room and after refreshing themselves with sundry potations proceeded to wipe the floor with the bar-keeper because he demanded payment for the refreshments. They will remain in jail some time, probably.

E. Lewis, colored, was fined the costs, \$3.15, for failing to procure a badge for his dog.

A Pleasant Occasion. At the hall of Cape Fear Lodge No. 2, I. O. O. F., last night, something in the nature of a surprise party was held—at least to one member of the Lodge—Mr. B. J. Jones, Past Grand Master. Mr. Jones is the ranking member of the Order in North Carolina, having been initiated into Cape Fear Lodge on the eighth day of July, 1845, and continuing an active member since that time, he has filled all the offices in the subordinate Lodge, been Grand Master of the Order in the State, Representative to the Sovereign Grand Lodge of the United States, and for a number of years has been Treasurer of the Grand Lodge of North Carolina. In token of their appreciation of these facts and the esteem in which Mr. Jones is held, his fellow members of the Lodge presented him last night with a handsome testimonial—a P. G. M. jewel. The presentation was made by R. G. Jno. D. Bellamy, Jr., in behalf of the brethren, in a felicitous manner, and with a speech that was received with much applause. The whole affair was a complete surprise to Mr. Jones, but he responded happily and feelingly. After the presentation some very fine music was rendered by a quartette of members—Messrs. Jas. D. Smith, J. W. Fleet, Jno. Grant and Wm. Register.

The jewel presented to Mr. Jones is of gold and silver, in form emblematic of the Order, and is engraved on one side with the words, "R. J. Jones, P. G. M.," and on the other, "From Members of Cape Fear Lodge No. 2, I. O. O. F., in recognition of 44 years active service, July 8th, 1845."

The occasion was a happy one. Many members of the Lodge were present and expressed their delight at the honor conferred on one who is held in such great esteem by all Odd Fellows in the city.

Cape Fear Lodge, though old is still vigorous and strong, and within the past year has received many accessions to its membership from the best material in the city.

Cotton Region Statistics. Charlotte had one inch of rainfall scored to her account yesterday by the Signal bureau; Weldon reported .87 of an inch, Florence .41, Wilmington .26, Cheraw and Wadesboro .25, Raleigh .15, with a trace at Lumberton and Newbern and no rainfall at all at Goldsboro. The maximum temperature ranged from 84 at Charlotte and Raleigh, 85 at Wilmington, to 94 degrees at Cheraw. Rain was reported from every district in the cotton belt.

Garbage Cremators. Some time ago our city authorities had under consideration a proposition to purchase a garbage crematory, but the matter was deferred or indefinitely postponed, and perhaps very wisely, for the experience of other cities with these patented contrivances for the disposal of garbage, etc., has not been at all satisfactory. The city of Savannah had one put up which has just been completed at a cost of \$4,000, and turns out to be a failure. The highest number of cart-loads of garbage burned in one day was only nineteen, and some days less than that. There is not draught enough, and the dimensions of the pit are not in harmony with the rest of the structure, so that the furnace, instead of clearing itself of the residuum after incineration, fouls or chokes up, and interferes with the successful operation of the crematory. It was erected on the Hughes plan by the United States Gas and Fuel Company, and is now in the hands of the courts for attaching creditors.

The Seaside Hotels. The editor of the Nashville Argonaut having been asked for information as to the seaside resorts near Wilmington by parties wishing to spend a month at some nice place, says he examined the Wilmington papers and "to our surprise and disappointment there was no advertisement of either of the resorts in either of the papers, or if there was, we failed to find it. All we could say was that we understood there were several nice places down there but could tell them no more. How on earth do men expect to make a success in business when they have not enterprise enough to let anybody know they are doing any. It is a fact that there is no advertisement of any regular seaside hotel in the Wilmington papers except one of "Atlantic View." Capt. Manning's place, and that does not fully set forth the advantages he can offer.
