The steamer Lisbon, from Black River, arrived here late yesterday afternoon with a large freight. She brought down the workmen and plant of the Phoenix Bridge Co., recently employed in the construction of the Cape Fear & Yadkin Valley Railroad bridge over Black River.

On motion of Mr. Jas. C. Stevenson, a committee was appointed to draft resolutions, which after amendment were adopted. The resolutions recite that within the past three months, on three occasions, the steamship company had advertised steamers to sail on certain days from New York, and solicited freight therefor, and then, without previous notice had changed the day of sailing, and that from time to time bills of lading had been signed for goods that were left on the dock at New York.

Death of W. H. McFarland. Mr. Wm. H. McFarland, for twenty years a trusted employe of the Wilmington & Weldon Railroad Company, and son of the late Jonah McFarland, died yesterday in this city, after a lingering illness. He was thirty-eight years of age; an honest, upright, energetic man, loyal to his friends and devoted to his family. He married a daughter of Col. Jas. G. Barr, and leaves a widow and two sons, besides his mother and a sister to mourn their loss.

The second annual report of the Citizens' Building and Loan Association makes a gratifying exhibit. The number of shares outstanding is 1,862, the amount paid in is \$25,500 share, the present value of which is \$27.89. The net earnings since the first series was issued amount to \$23.39 per share, or nine and a half per cent. per annum on the amount paid in. The Association made 59 mortgage loans amounting to \$44,645, and 34 stock loans, aggregating \$5,286.25. The total installments paid in, with profits, etc., amount to \$52,116.41.

A correspondent writes the STAR, Sept. 13th: The first bale of new cotton was brought to town to-day by Wm. W. Green, of Cross-roads. It weighed 506 pounds and was bought by Biggs & Davenport, at 10 cents per pound, and was shipped to Norfolk, Va.

A press dispatch from New York reports the arrival at the quarantine station there of the pilot boat David Carl, with the captain and crew of eleven men of the German barque Erna. The barque hailed from Wilmington, N. C., and when off Barnegat was stove in by heavy seas. The David Carl tried to tow her in, but shortly after getting a line to her the barque capsized. The Erna cleared from this port August 26th last with a cargo of lumber for Villa Constitution, shipped by E. Kidder's Son.

The Atlantic engine boys had lots of fun last night. They dressed up a dummy to represent a dead negro and threw it out of one of the upstairs windows. It struck the hydrant and then fell with a "dull thud" to the ground. A crowd quickly gathered around the supposed corpse, and the boys rushed down stairs, tenderly picked up the inanimate form and with many expressions of sorrow carried it into the building and laid it upon the floor. A report soon spread on the streets that an unknown colored man had fallen out of a window at the engine house and broken his neck. A large crowd quickly gathered, but everybody was denied admission to the hall, on the plea that the coroner must first view the body. One of the boys thrust a ten dollar Confederate bill into the hand of a darkey standing near the door and told him to go to a drug store and get a bottle of arnica. The man started off in a run on his errand of mercy, and perhaps he is still running, for nothing has been seen of him since. In the meantime the news had travelled down town and newspaper reporters with pockets full of note-books were on hand, eager to get the particulars, and in a few minutes the Chief of the Fire Department arrived in hot haste, with the Assistant Chief, and a crowd of followers. The Chief was invited in to look at the "remains" lying covered with a sheet on the floor, but he had seen enough and refusing to look at the ghastly object started off to hurry up the coroner. But in the meantime the joke leaked out, and the crowd learning that it had been badly sold rapidly dwindled away.

The Criminal Court for New Hanover county will meet to-morrow and continue one week, the Superior Court convening on Monday, the 23d inst. There are a good many cases, but none of much importance for trial. A continuance to the next term will be asked for and in all probability granted for the trial of Bryan Carroll, charged with poisoning his wife. Iredell Meares and Sol. C. Cotton Region Bulletin. The rainfall at Goldsboro for the 24 hours ended at 6 p. m. yesterday, was an inch and ten-hundredths. Weldon reported 36-100, Newbern 41-100, Wilmington 14-100, Florence 5-100, and Raleigh 2-100. The maximum temperature, was 88 degrees at Cheraw, 86 at Lumberton, Florence, Wadesboro, Charlotte and Goldsboro, 82 at Wilmington, Raleigh and Newbern, and 80 at Weldon. The minimum averaged 62 degrees.
