In the case of Edward Larkins, the colored boy on trial for larceny, the jury after remaining out all of Wednesday, failed to agree and were discharged. Yesterday, Larkins, through his counsel, submitted to the charge. It is understood that the jury stood ten for conviction and two for acquittal.
Jerry Pearsall, charged with disorderly conduct--appeal from the City court--was found guilty. The court suspended judgment on payment of costs.
Henry Cane, the colored man who attempted to pass a bogus check on a Market street store-keeper, was convicted of false pretences and sentenced to three years in the State penitentiary.

Annie Ballard and Ellen Sidbury, convicted of an affray, were fined the costs in the case.
Lucy Jordan and Patsy Peden, mother and daughter, were charged with the larceny of wearing apparel, the property of Laura Johnson, colored, and the trial of the case occupied the time of the court until a recess was taken until this morning.

The Gulf Cyclone.
Yesterday at 11:30 a. m. the Signal officer here was advised by telegram from the Chief Signal officer at Washington, that the Gulf cyclone, last reported off Galveston, was probably crossing Southern Florida to the East, and that vessels sailing South were likely to encounter strong gales. Later in the day further advices were received, that the cyclone had passed to the eastward across Florida, and high northeast winds prevailed north of Jacksonville. Cautionary signals were ordered up at Charleston.
In this vicinity up to midnight, there were no indications of the approach of the cyclone. No further advices had been received by the Signal Service observer, the weather was clear and cool, with but little wind, and the barometer about normal.

The Burglary Case.
In the Criminal Court yesterday, Solicitor Moore announced that the special venire of seventy summoned for Friday need not attend, as their services will not be required. The reason for this was not stated, but it was rumored about the Court House that the negro boy Marcellus Radcliffe, whose trial for burglary was fixed for to-day, had agreed to submit to the charge of burglary in the second degree, the punishment for which is imprisonment in the penitentiary.
