- The Colfax came up to the city yesterday evening. The summer being over she will hereafter make Wilmington headquarters instead of

- Mrs. E. B. Wiggins left last night for the Northern markets to purchase a stock of millinery for the fall trade. She will return next week and will bring with her a fashionable milliner.

- Rev. Dr. Pritchard, who has been in attendance upon the Eistern Baptist Association the past week, in Duplin, is expected to fill his pulpit at the Frst Baptist Church to day at 11 a. m. and 8 p. m.

- Steamer A. P. Hurt, Capt. Irvin Robinson, from Fayetteville, are rived late yesterday afternoon with a flat in tow and a large freight of cotton and naval stores. She left on the return trip about 9 p. m.

- Rev. Mr. Pearson left for Tarboro yesterday morning. During his short stay here he was the recipient of many attentions. Friday afternoon, in company with several friends, he took a trip over the Seacoast road to the Hammocks.

- Nearly every magistrate in the city was aroused from his peaceful slumbers a morning or two ago about 3 o'clock, by a man who wanted a bail warrant to arrest some one who owed him \$2.00 and was about to leave the city. He didn't get the warrant, for all that it is said some tall swearing was done.

- It was as dark as mud on the east side of South Front street last night, particularly near Dock street, and several collisions on that crowded thoroughfare resulted from the woeful lack of light. A Good Fish Market. There were some twenty carts filled with fish in market yesterday afternoon-and but little else. Pig-fish, black-fish, snappers, spots, blue-fish, sheep-head, flounders and mulletsall sold at from 12; to 20 cents a bunch at retail; roe mullets bringing the highest price. The supply of oysters was limited, but there were a few fine samples of New River bivalves in the shell at fancy prices. o'clock.

Wilmington Keeps Ahead.

Wilmington continues to keep ahead of the other Southern ports in the prices paid for cotton. Yesterday, sales were made here on a basis of 10 3-16 cents for middling, while the Charleston market was quoted dull and nominal at 10 cents, Savannah, quiet at 9 11-16 cents; Mobile, 92 cents; New Orleans, 10 cents, and Gal veston, 9 15-16 cents. Besides paying better prices, Wilmington's facilities for handling cotton are unsurpassed, with compresses, railroad depots and warehouses all at the water's edge, where ships take the bales direct from the presses, and cargoes are loaded with greater dispatch and with more satisfaction to shipmasters than at other ports.

With a realization of all these facts the daily receipts of the staple at this port must continue to grow, bringing increased activity in other branches of trade, extending our commerce, and adding to the general prosperity of the city.

Kuights Templars,

The representatives from Wilmington Commandery, who attended the Grand Conclave in Washington last week, have all returned, and express themselves as well pleased with the trip and the kind attentions shown them everywhere. There were not more than fifty Knights from North Carolina at the Conclave. The morning of the grand parade the Knights were in line from nine o'clock in the morning until two in the afternoon; most of the time in front of a fine residence on C street, the proprietor of which, a Mr. Tompkins, threw open his doors and invited the entire North Carolina delegation luncheon. Many availed themselves of the gentleman's hospitality, and were royally entertained.

Alderman, Flanner & Co. have made a model of the invention, which will be on exhibition at the State Fair in Raleigh this week. They say that they have heard manufacturers of grates and mantels speak in the highest terms of


