A meeting of the Association of the Third N. C. Infantry, Army of Northern Virginia, was held last night. Col. Wm. L. DeRosset, the President, announced the object of the meeting—to take action regarding the death of ex President Jefferson Davis, an honorary member of the Association.

Dr. Thos. F. Wood, surgeon of the regiment, offered the following testimonials, which were unanimously adopted as expressive of the feelings of the Association, to-wit:

We come to pay the tribute of respect to the memory of our departed and honored member, the Hon. Jefferson Davis, with bowed heads and saddened hearts. Stereotyped phraseology cannot give expression to our grief, nor can the wealth of words portray the greatness of a character which has been impressed upon us by his life. For a quarter of a century he has been a target for the venomous shafts of our enemies who did not dread to see the fulfillment of their acts, who could realize that by striking at our grand chieftain they were assailing living and incorruptible principles of which he was but the epitome, and had they succeeded in his personal annihilation, the principles would have remained unscathed and undiminished. As our substitutionary head he bore his suffering with that dignified patience, characteristic of true heroism, such heroism as can only flow from the sanctified principles inspired by the Holy Scriptures. Ripe with years, sanctified in spirit, peacefully he passed to the reward of the justified.

We, the Association of the Third North Carolina Infantry, do hereby resolve, That we desire to pay this and tribute of respect to the memory of our dead chieftain, and express our sorrow for the bereaved members of his family, trusting to the consolations of that infinite love to be found

in our divine Redeemer for them and for us. Resolved, That we offer this testimonial to his stricken family with assurances of our profound sympathy.
