Board of Health Dr. F. W. Potter, Superintendent of Health, in his report to the Board of Aldermen says: "I would beg for a furnace to destroy garbage, etc., that is now carried just outside of the city limits; many persons have made complaint of the great quantity of soiled paper that is carried about by the wind. If there is no actual harm in this paper, it looks bad; but I believe there is danger in the trash and small pieces of paper wafted here and there-it is not the quantity of filth that we so much dread as the quality. I am also ordered by the Board of Health to have all tainted meat (all unfit for use) burned, under my personal supervision. To do this will require many cords of wood and much kerosene oil. A furnace would remedy many inconveniences and allay very much fault finding; and we believe many germs of disease might be destroyed that could not otherwise be reached.
