The Fayetteville Independent Light Infantry Withdraw from the State Guard. The Fayetteville Independent Light Infantry, at a full meeting of members of the company, both active and retired, held last Monday night, adopted a resolution to withdraw from the State Guard, and have notified Gov. Fowle, who it is understood will acquiesce in this action of the company.

The Fayetteville company will form an independent battalion, the officers holding their commissions as heretofore and being subject to the orders of the Governor of the State. The members will retain their arms and equipments, which are furnished by the State.

The chief reason for this withdrawal of the F. I. I. from the Guard, is the order issued some time ago requiring all the companies of the Guard to comply with the State regulation and wear blue uniforms instead of the gray.
