OUTLINES.

Chandler introduced a resolution in the Senate yesterday, providing for the counting of a quorum when one is present and not voting; the conference report on bill to provide a temporary government for the territory of Oklahoma was passed, and the bill now goes to the President; in the House the Appropriation bill was taken up and a little progress was made; a strike on Southern post-offices was incidentally brought up; a question on the floor elicited answers which caused much fun and laughter; a resolution was introduced by a member as a protest against the business portion of the bill; the business portion of the bill was destroyed by fire Tuesday night and two lives were lost; a boiler explosion occurred at New Castle, Pennsylvania, yesterday, which instantly killed three men, and injured six others; one of the injured died in the fly-wheel pit and the other died to a pulp; President Carnot, of France, visited Corsica yesterday and made an address commending the people that all dissensions should be ended, and that only the interests of the country should be considered; more breaks are reported from the Mississippi river levees, and seven hundred square miles of country will be overflowed; no loss of life is anticipated; a five-story brick was burned in Rochester, N. Y., yesterday morning, causing a very serious fire; a postal clerk in New York has been arrested for robbing a mail-train; money was found on the person; the eight-hour law in Chicago is spreading to other workers of the city; makers of suits and vests are preparing for the carpenters' strike bids; the New York market: Money easy at 2 1/2 per cent; cotton firm; sales to-day 250 bales, middling uplands 12 1/2 cents, middling Orleans 12 1/2 cents, southern extra drill but 12 1/2 cents, fair extra \$2 40 @ 2 50, fair drill, lower and unsettled; No. 2, 4 1/2 @ 5 00 cents at elevator; corn 2 1/2 @ 2 50 cents and quiet; No. 2, 4 1/2 @ 5 00 cents at elevator; rosin firm; strain-rod 1 1/2 @ 1 37 1/2 @ 1 42 1/2; sugar 11 @ 11 37 1/2 @ 11 42 1/2; coffee 11 @ 11 37 1/2 @ 11 42 1/2.

LOCAL DOTS.

John J. Dille, formerly Secretary of the Indiana Republican State Central Committee, is a candidate for the Governorship of Oklahoma. Dille is the man who was appointed land agent at Guthrie by Mr. Harrison, and who it was shown on an investigation by Secretary Noble had connived with his brother and other associates to block off claims before the proclamation opening the territory to settlement had been made. Secretary Noble asked for his removal, but in spite of his request and the proofs of Dille's guilt, the President paid no attention to the request and Dille stuck. He knew too many campaign secrets to be bounced. A singular case of mistaken identification occurred at Pittsburg a few days ago, when a doctor from Johnstown recognized the body of a young man who had been killed on a railroad as that of his son. He had given orders for the shipment of the body to Johnstown for interment. A few hours later, when visiting some friends, he had scarcely been seated when his son, hale and hearty, walked in and greeted him, to the astonishment and joy of the father, who had wept him as dead. It was simply a case of remarkable resemblance. Mrs. Newton, of Scottdale, Pennsylvania, gave proof of the fact that she didn't consider marriage a failure by presenting her astonished husband with four girl babies at one birth on February the 12th. The four little ones are flourishing, and are as much alike as four peas. They were baptised last Sunday in the Catholic church of that town, to which the parents, Irish people, belong.
