OUTLINES. The Land Forfeiture bill was further considered in the Senate. When Mr. Call's amendment was voted down by a strict party vote, as were also several other amendments which were offered; an amendment offered by Mr. Moody was finally adopted and the bill passed without discussion; the proceedings in the House were opened by a lively spat between the Speaker and Mr. Mills, on a question of ruling, which the latter defeated by an outrage, but the matter was passed without a conclusion being reached; a debate followed on the bill regarding classification of worsted goods and woolsens, and a vote taken, the program being present an adjournment was moved and carried.

It is stated that the warden of the State Prison, who is consistently refusing to give out information, will certainly take it upon himself, within the present week, to inform the public that it takes no more time to him when the affair takes shape than it does to a man who is in the habit of expressing himself that it will take better for all concerned to let it sleep over early in the week.
