A Handsome Yacht.

The steam yacht Electra, of the New York Yacht Club, came up to the city yesterday afternoon and laid along-side the wharf between Dock and Market streets. Mr. Eldridge T. Gerry of New York, Commodore of the Club and owner of the Electra was on board with his family and Dr. Redburn of New York, on their way from Charleston, S. C., to Hampton, Va. Some of the members of the party left the yacht last evening and took the North-bound train on the Atlantic Coast Line.

The Electra is one of the largest and finest pleasure yachts afloat. She is about 180 feet in length, and has a crew of thirty. She is said to have cost \$275,000.

Steamship Delaware.

The steamship Delaware, of the Clyde Line, arrived yesterday from New York with a full cargo and several passengers. She will leave to-morrow, on her return to New York, having been placed permanently on the line between that city and Wilmington. The Delaware is one of the largest vessels of the Clyde Line, and has excellent accommodations for passengers. DISTRICT AND CIRCUIT COURTS.

Cases Heard Before Judge Seymour Yesterday.

In the United States District Court yesterday, Neil Bass, convicted of retailing liquor without license, was sentenced to be imprisoned for thirty days in the jail of Robeson county and to pay a fine of \$100.

N. A. McIntyre, from Robeson county, charged with sending an obscene letter through the mails, was discharged, the indictment having been quashed.

In the case of Jos. King, (from Robeson county) convicted of having an unregistered still in his possession, the following order has made: Defendant has been in jail four months, has heretofore been adjudged insane, and is utterly insolvent. For these reasons the United States does not put him into custody for the costs.

The jurors were discharged for the term, and the Court took a recess at 5 p. m. until 8 a. m. to-day.

In the Circuit Court the following cases were heard: Geo. L. Arp vs. William Daughtry and Allen Daughtry, trading as Allen Daughtry & Bro. Judgment for plaintiff was given in the sum of \$3,109.06.

It was ordered that Sol. B. Williams, of Warrenton, Warren county, be appointed a commissioner of the Circuit Court.

An order was issued in the case of F. E. Patrick vs. W. & W. Railroad Co., for prosecution bond to be filed in thirty days or the case will be dismissed; complaint to be filed in thirty days, and sixty days then allowed defendants to answer.

In case of Geo. H. Smith vs. Mary E. Smith and others, plaintiff was called and failed to answer. Judgment, non suit.
