MEMORIAL DAY.

An Old Soldier Suggests that the Address be Delivered in the Opera House.

The wish is unanimously expressed that the memorial address next Tuesday, by the Hon. Chas. M. Stedman, on the life of Gen. William MacRae, be delivered in the Opera House.

The reasons for this are manifold. Much care, time and patience have been expended on this effort, and it is but justice to the speaker to give him the advantage of the place best suited to the proper delivery of the oration.

There are many who wish to hear this oration in its entirety; and wish, also, to hear it in comfort, and freed from the noise and bustle incident to a crowd gathered in the open air.

Rev. F. W. E. Peschauer returned yesterday from the Convention of the N. C. Lutheran Synod, and will hold services to-morrow in Luther Memorial building, preaching in German in the morning and in English at night.

The pulpit of the First Baptist Church will be filled to-morrow (Sunday) at 11 a. m., by the Rev. R. C. Beaman, pastor of Fifth Street M. E. Church, and at 8 p. m. by the Rev. W. McMillen, of the First Presbyterian Mission Chapel.

A city reader of the STAR says that many of the stones placed at the intersection of the streets for the convenience of surveys of streets and lots in the city need attention, and as it is a matter of importance our city authorities should see to it immediately.
