STATE GUARD TO GIVE THE NECESSARY LEAVES OF ABSENCE, AS NON-ATTENDANCE OF ANY COMPANY EMBRACED IN THIS ORDER MAY LEAD TO THE DISBANDMENT OF SUCH COMPANY.

The object of these encampments being the instruction and improvement of the Guard, strict discipline will be enforced, in accordance with the regulations and such additional orders as may be prescribed by the Commander-in-Chief. Instruction and exercises will be mainly directed to camp duties, guard duty, skirmish drill, the school of the battalion and to rifle practice.

Company commanders will see that the men carry as little baggage as possible; boxes and trunks will not be allowed in the company streets. No member of the Guard will be allowed to appear in citizen's clothes while his regiment is in camp, and officers and men found disobeying this will be liable to arrest.

Each encampment will be visited by the Commander-in-Chief and reviewed by him on days to be hereafter announced.
