CITY REAL ESTATE.

Advancing Rapidly in Value as Shown by Actual Sales.

That there is a steady enhancement in values of real estate in the city of Wilmington, is proven conclusively by actual sales of property made by Messrs. Cronly & Morris, auctioneers and real estate brokers.

On the 27th of February last the firm sold at private sale Block No. 29 (bounded by Bladen, Harnett, Second and Third streets, and containing six lots, each 60 by 330 feet) for \$5,000.

On the 20th of May they resold the same property, privately, for \$6,250; and on yesterday, after sub-dividing the square into forty-eight lots, sold the same by public auction, the aggregate amounting to \$9,380.

In the Criminal Court yesterday the following cases were disposed of, viz: Richard Cooper, convicted of assault and battery, was fined \$20 and costs.

James Evans, charged with assault and battery. Not guilty. The case of Jno. L. Barker, charged with slander, was not prossed.

The grand jury made their usual visit to the jail and county poor house and submitted the following report: We have examined the county jail and find it clean and in good sanitary condition and the premises well cared for.

Also, we have visited the county poor house and house of correction and find that the temporary buildings are not sufficient to accommodate the inmates, and we respectfully recommend the erection at once of a temporary building, say 15x30 feet, for the better accommodation of the inmates.

We find that the superintendent is discharging his duty as well as possible under existing circumstances and that the food is ample and well prepared. [Signed] A. J. GRADY, Fore'n.

The grand and petit juries were discharged for the term and the court in the afternoon took a recess until 10 a. m. to-day, when a few cost cases will be called.
