The outlook for tobacco in Nash and Wilson counties is ahead of anything yet heard of. The tobacco crop is looking fine, the plant being healthy and in a vigorous growing condition.

Cotton and corn crops are also in fine growing condition. In some places forms have already appeared on the cotton plant.
