Changes in the Second Regiment—New Drill Regulations, Etc. General Order No. 9, issued by Adjutant General James D. Glenn, June 10th, announces the following changes in the N. C. State Guard, viz:

The Manual of Guard Duty, prepared by Lieut. L. W. V. Kennon, Sixth U. S. Infantry, having been approved by the War Department "for the government of all United States troops in the performance of Guard Duty," the same is hereby prescribed for the use of the North Carolina State Guard.

Paragraphs 74, 89, 105, 115, 122, 125, 133, 143, 163, 177, 183, 190, 199 of the Manual, which contain provisions for the new drill regulations, will be executed in accordance with the tactics in General Order No. 2, C. S., and any company parading under such orders in any other than the prescribed dress will not be recognized.
