SOUTHPORT'S ROAD.

It is to be Built-An Important Piece of Railroad Information.

The Charlotte News says: "The proposed railroad from Southport, on the coast below Wilmington, to Memphis, Tenn., is to be known as the South Atlantic & Northwestern Railroad, It is to be built, and work is to commence within ninety days from date. Col. Risley, who has engineered the scheme, arrived at the Central Hotel to-day direct from England, and has perfected all arrangements to begin the work of building the road without delay. He has secured all the necessary money, and there is now no obstacle in the way of building the road. Col. Risley's company means business, and work is to be commenced at ten different points along the line within three months. Col. FIRE DEPARTMENT.

New Relief Valves and Controlling Nozzles for Fire Engines.

The new controlling nozzles for firehose, and relief valves for steam fire engines, received by the city yesterday for the Fire Department were tested in the afternoon with the "Atlantic" engine in the presence of the Chief and Assistant Chief. With this new nozzle the firemen will be able to control the water at all times and under any pressure, by simply turning a valve that shuts off the water supply entirely, or regulates it as the pipemen may desire, to throw a spray stream or a solid stream, or both to-

gether. The use of these nozzles will be a great aid to the efficiency of the department and will often prevent damage to property from excessive use of water.

All the engines will be supplied with these relief valves as soon as they can be procured. The "Atlantic" is the first engine in the country to be fitted up so that one relief valve will operate both gates or water-outlets, thus effecting a saving of \$100 for each engine: as heretofore two valves have been used and considered necessary. This change was made by the makers of the Silsby engine at the suggestion of Capt. E. G. Parmele, engineer of Wilmington Steam Fire Engine Co. No. 1, and the idea, although at first considered impracticable by them has since, been adopted and highly commended. The relief valves and controlling nozzles are used in conjunction; the service performed by the former being to relieve the hose and pump from the great pressure that would otherwise be caused by shutting off the stream at the nozzle.

One of the pumps of the "Atlantic" fire steamer, which was out of order and was sent North for repairs, was also tested and found satisfactory. And a new axle for the "Cape Fear" hose reel was also received.

A Fine Day's Sport.

String beans in heavy supply-N. C. wax, half barrels, 30 to 75

cents; green 25 to 50 cents. Cucumbers -fancy Charleston \$1 to \$1 25; other grades 50 to 75 cents. Tomatoes-fancy \$2 50; medium \$2 to \$2 25. Squash 75 cents to \$1 per barrel. Have received several cars of watermelons and they are selling at a range of \$25 to \$40 per hundred. Cherries-fancy dark 15 to 16 cents; others from 5 to 12 cents. Blackberries-N. C. 14 to 15 cents.
