# THE IRON OF THE SOUTH.

Cotton and timber are two of the wealth-making products of the South. Iron is another. It is the king of metals, the most plentiful and yet the most valuable of all. There are few countries on the globe which have not more or less of it, and some in which it exists in great abund-

country but in Europe, however large their products may be. The probabilities are that the increase of the iron product for the next ten years will be relatively much greater than for the last ten for the consumption of iron more than keeps pace with the increase of population. In discussing this subject in his

speech at Knoxville, Tenn., referring to the future of the South as an iron manufacturing section, Hon. Iere Baxter said:

"Iron, is the meter as well as the motor of civilization. All trade is governed by its price, and its consumption in the United States is increasing annually not only in quantity but per capita. In this country the per capita consumption has doubled in about seventeen years. and the population doubles every twenty-eight years. This gives a double geometrical progression, and if these ratios should continue until 1917, we should consume 62,000,000 tons of iron. Should this country consume 62,000,000 tons at that time, and should the South produce one-half of that amount, or say 31,000,000 tons, and should it receive \$12 a ton therefor, the Southern iron interest then would yield the enormous amount of \$372,000,000, or an amount greater than the present annual income from the cotton crop, which would result ultimately in giving the Southern country a monopoly of both the cotton and the iron markets.'


Sec. 3 prescribes the affidavit to be taken by the voter when he registers. Any wilful and corrupt false statements in said affidavit to any material questions propounded as herein authorized shall be perjury.

Sec. 4. A uniform poll tax of \$2 is hereby imposed on every male inhabitant of this State between the age of 21 and 60 years except persons who are deaf and dumb or blind, or who are maimed by the loss

of a hand or foot, to be used in aid of the common schools and for no other purposes, said tax to be a lien only upon taxable property, provided, however, that the board of complexion is fresh. supervisors of any county-may for the purpose of aiding the common schools in that county increase the poll tax in said county, but in no case shall the entire poll tax exceed in any one year \$3 on each head. The payment of the poll tax imposed is declared to be a qualification to vote, provided, further, that no criminal proceedings shall be allowed to enforce the collection of the poll tax.

In this country it exists in great abundance, but nowhere is its existence so common, and in such great quantity and covering such a wide area as in the Southern States. It is found in belts reaching from the .Potomac to the Rio Grande, and from Kentucky to Florida, some of the deposits being equal in quantity and quality to those of the famed Lake Superior region.

As a general thing the most extensive of these deposits, which can be worked most easily and to the best advantage, are in close proximity to coal and lime stone, both of which are necessary to convert the ore into workable iron, and these are commandable at a low price compared with other sections, which, taken in connection with the cheapness of the ore itself, must eventually give the South a monopoly of the iron-making business.

Twenty years ago there was very little iron made in the South. Ten years ago there much more, but little compared with the amount made now. And yet while iron is found over such a wide range of territory and exists in many localities in such great, practically inexhaustible abundance, the mining of the ore and the making of iron, as industries, have been entered upon in only a few of the Southern States, Kentucky, Tennessee, Virginia, Georgia and Alabama. 
