A NORTHWEST STORM.

Wind, Rain, Lightning and Hail—Frost Predicted for this Section.

The storm which passed over Wilmington Sunday afternoon was accompanied by hail. In the northern part of the city the ground was almost covered with the icy pellets, but south of Market street the fall was very slight.

A dispatch from Columbia, S. C., says a terrific hail storm passed over part of Richland county. Immense quantities of stones, as big as peach kernels, were piled up in cotton rows.

The cotton region bulletin issued last evening reports the minimum temperature at 40° at Charlotte, Wadesboro, Lumberton and Weldon yesterday morning, with frost at Charlotte. At Wilmington 43° was the lowest point reached by the mercury.

Colder weather was experienced in the Southwest; the average minimum temperature being 36° for Little Rock, Memphis, Mobile, Montgomery and New Orleans.
