FAYETTEVILLE, Nov. 4.—Sheriff Smith's majority in Cross Creek township is 909; Sutton 837. So far as returns have come in the majority is about 890.

ROCKY POINT, Nov. 4.—Bellamy, 99; Croon, 169. Burgaw gives Bellamy 111; Croon, 103.

BURGAW, November 4.—Returns indicate the election of R. C. Johnston. Moore, Clerk, and Johnston, Sheriff, are largely ahead from the townships heard from.

WAKE COUNTY. RALEIGH, N. C., Nov. 4.—Wake county gives an estimated Democratic majority of 500; Guilford county, 250; Chatham county, 600; Rowan, 1,200; Lenoir, 600.

Cheatham, Republican, for Congress, carries the county by 1,000 majority over Newborne, Democrat.

RALEIGH, Nov. 4.—Scattering returns show the election of the following Democratic Congressmen: Branch, 1st district; Grady, 3rd district; Bunn, 4th district; Williams, 5th district; Alexander, 6th district; Henderson, 7th district.

RALEIGH, N. C., November 4.—Returns from 169 precincts out of 1,600 show net Democratic gains over 1888 of 4,400.
