Mr. R. M. McIntire, one of the parties interested in the sewer, stated that they had gone to work after making application to the proper authorities.

Mr. S. H. Fishblate said the company had received permission from the Chief of Police to prosecute the work, and he asked that they be allowed to continue it.

Dr. Wood, upon invitation, addressed the Board. He had carefully studied the whole matter of a system of sewerage for the city, and regarded what was being done as jeopardizing the health of the whole city; it was a piece of patchwork from beginning to end, and dangerous in the extremean experiment that had been tried by other cities with the most disastrous results. He argued, also, that it would besides defeat any public system of sewerage by the city; instanced the fact that the temperature of the river in the summer reaches the point of putrefaction; Northern cities could with impunity do what we dare not do. It is no secret, he said, that genuine typhoid fever has increased, and its origin begins in sewage matter. He argued strongly in behalf of a complete and perfect system of sewerage by the city, under the direction of a competent scientific engi-

Dr. Thomas expressed himself as thoroughly in accord with Dr. Wood, and urged the importance of a properly constrong intimation that way last Tuesstructed system of sewerage.
