TUESDAY'S ELECTIONS.

RETURNS STILL OF A CHEERING CHARACTER.

House of Representatives Conceded to the Democrats by an Overwhelming Majority - Probable Gain of Four United States Senators...

NEW YORK. NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—The Associated Press reports show the election of 88 Democratic Assemblymen in New York State and 80 Republicans.

ELMIRA, Nov. 6.—Hosea H. Rockefeller, dem., is elected Representative in Congress from the 28th district...

CONNECTICUT. HARTFORD, November 6.—The Legislature stands—Senate—Republicans 8, Democrats 16; House—134 Republicans, 117 Democrats.

NEW HAMPSHIRE. CONCORD, Nov. 6.—Republicans conceded the election of Daniels, dem., in the 2nd Congressional district by a plurality of 50 to 60.

OHIO. TOLEDO, November 6.—A Canton special to the Blade says lack of telegraph facilities in Holmes county prevents the exact ascertaining of the vote in McKinley's district.

CANTON, OHIO, Nov. 6.—Unless the official count in Stark and Holmes counties is correct, McKinley is defeated by 27—a gain of 2,700 in the district.

MINNESOTA. ST. PAUL, November 6.—The latest figures from the 5th Congressional district indicate the possible election of Halvorson, alliance, over Comstock, rep., and Whitman, dem.

MINNEAPOLIS, Nov. 6.—Returns from 66 counties give Merriam, rep., for Governor 79,069 votes; Wilson, dem., 70,243; and Owen, Alliance, 48,244—a plurality of 3,826 for Merriam, with fifteen counties to be heard from.

KENTUCKY. LOUISVILLE, Nov. 6.—There is very little change in the election situation. Latest reports show that Congressman John H. Wilson, rep., has been re-elected in the 11th district by 2,000 majority; J. W. Kendall, dem., has a majority of 24 in nine counties and 1,175 Democratic majority at the last election in the remainder of the district.

LOUISVILLE, Nov. 6.—Returns are coming slowly from remote precincts. The Republican Committee claims that Carter will have a small majority, but Dixon's election is generally conceded by from 200 to 400. The Democrats claim two majority in the State Senate.



ILLINOIS.

CHICAGO, November 6.—The Democratic State Central Committee says that the Legislature, on joint assembly, will stand 101 Republicans and 101 Democrats and two Farmers' Alliance Representatives.

CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—The Tribune, Rep., finds the result in the State Legislature to be as follows: Senate—Republicans 27, Democrats 24; H. M. B. A. 2, Joint Assembly—Republicans 102, Democrats 100, F. M. B. A. 20.

CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—Chairman Jones, of the Republican State Central committee, according to the Daily News, concedes the Legislature to the Democrats, but claims the election of the Republican State ticket by majorities from 6,000 to 8,000.

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 6.—The latest information from Arkansas is to the effect that official returns from nine counties in the 2d district and a close estimate of the remaining counties give Breckinridge about 700 majority.

LITTLE ROCK, Nov. 6.—Official, unofficial and estimated returns from the 2nd district give the following majorities for Breckinridge: Pope county, 1-000; Arkansas, 717, where all but one township, 47 of the 1st district, are conceded to Breckinridge.

TEXAS. HOUSTON, Nov. 6.—At midnight the Republican Central Committee conceded the election of the entire Farmers' Alliance ticket, with the possible exception of Millets, candidate for Governor, who may be defeated by Humphrey by a small majority.

MICHIGAN. DETROIT, Nov. 6.—It is thought the whole Democratic State ticket is elected by from 6,000 to 10,000 plurality. The Legislature is also Democratic; the Senate by about three majority, and the House by some fifteen on a fusion vote with the Patrons of Industry, who have the balance of power.

IOWA. DES MOINES, November 6.—Nearly complete official returns on the Secretary of State, with a few counties partly estimated, show that McFarland, rep., has a plurality of 2,185. The remainder of the State ticket is probably divided about equal.

CALIFORNIA. SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 6.—One thousand one hundred and fourteen precincts in California, including 173 precincts in this city, give Markham, rep., a plurality of 10,134.

MONTANA. HELENA, Nov. 6.—Returns are coming slowly from remote precincts. The Republican Committee claims that Carter will have a small majority, but Dixon's election is generally conceded by from 200 to 400. The Democrats claim two majority in the State Senate.

NEBRASKA.

OMAHA, Nov. 6.—Boyd, dem., is elected Governor by 4,000 to 5,000 plurality. Most of the Republican State ticket below Governor is elected.

KANSAS. KANSAS CITY, Nov. 6.—Indications now point to the election of H. W. Snow, dem., as Congressman from the 9th district, over E. Payson, rep. Republican candidate Snow's possible election. This is a big victory for the Democrats, as Payson carried this district by 3,000 majority in 1888.

NORTH DAKOTA.

MINNEAPOLIS, Nov. 6.—The Journal's Fargo, N. D., special says: "Incomplete returns indicate that the Legislature will have sixty Republicans out of ninety-three members, the balance being divided between the Democrats and the Independents."

SOUTH DAKOTA. ST. PAUL, MINN., November 6.—Independent Alliance information from eighteen counties in South Dakota shows Loucke, ind., for Governor, to have 8,000 plurality over Mellette, rep., and for Auditor.

COLORADO. DENVER, Nov. 6.—Official returns will be required to determine the official result of the election in this State. The Democrats claim that they have elected the State Treasurer, Attorney General and Superintendent of Public Instruction.
