LOOKING SOUTHWARD.

The fact that Mr. Jay Gould, the leading railroad manipulator of this country and one of its most'successful and ablest financiers, has been giving attention of late to the South has not failed to attract attention. He is on another tour, accompanied by several solid railroad men and capitalists.

In commenting upon this a few days ago we remarked that the probabilities are that it will lead to some new dears on the Southern rail road chess board in which the South wil be considerably interested. I is now stated that one of the objects of this tour is to effect an arrangement between certain Southern systems of roads to run in connection with the Southern Pacific, of which Mr. Gould is one of the principal owners and the controlling spirit.

The tendency of capital for rail road building for the past several years has been Southward, and in consequence for the past few years the new mileage in the South has been somewhat more than half the total mileage of the whole country; but until recently the attention of the great railroad kings had not been turned in this direction.




