



FOR A NEW PARTY.

seems to be taking shape in the West. The report comes from Springfield, Illinois, that the three F. M. B. A. (Farmers' Mutual Benefit Association) members of the Legislature are active in pushing it. The effort will be to embrace the Farmers' Alliance, the Farmers' Mutual Benefit Association, by which the three members above alluded to were elected, the Patrons of Husbandry, the Knights of Labor, and all other organizations composed of farmers or men of other industries. Circulars are now being sent to the land organizations of these respective bodies asking them to co-operate in the movement, not as organizations but as individuals, difficulty being anticipated in getting so many organizations, some so much more numerous than others, and with different interest, to harmonize in a common movement for political action

The plan is something similar to that pursued in Nebraska in the last election, when the men of the various organizations supported the State ticket nominated. In order to prevent conflict as much as possible they have fixed up a platform which is intended to embrace the essential points upon which these various organizations are supposed to agree, and avoid anything in which they might be supposed to differ. It is the "declaration of principles" which forms part of the petition which is sent out to the various organizations for a convention to be held in Cinbe remembered that Cincinnati was the place selected by Col.
