TERRIBLE TRAGEDY.

The College at Monroe, N. C., Destroyed by Fire—Two of the Students Perish in the Flames—Another Boy Seriously Burned.

Intelligence was received here yesterday, from Monroe, N. C., of the complete destruction by fire at an early hour yesterday morning of Prof. Andrew's school building at that place, and the burning to death of two of the students—one named Pemberton, from Little Rock, Ark., and the other, Bost, from Cabarrus county, N. C.

Particulars of the sad occurrence are rather meagre. The fire was discovered about 4 o'clock. It broke out in the upper part of the building, and it is supposed was caused by a defective chimney. The three boys were asleep in rooms on the third floor.

RALEIGH, March 5. SENATE. CALENDAR. The Revenue bill was taken up on its third reading; an amendment was adopted that the clause allowing tax payers to deduct \$1,000 in giving in salary be stricken out. The bill passed third reading.
