The Government's financial statement shows a deficiency in the U. S. Treasury of \$800,000, instead of the usual balance. Gen. C., four years ago, was convicted of manslaughter and sentenced to twenty-one years in the State penitentiary. Seven U. S. soldiers charged with the murder of A. J. Hunt at Walla Walla, Wash., are on trial in the Superior Court at that place. Heavy rains in Iowa have caused damage to property and loss of life. N.
