Goldsboro Argus: The Goldsboro Lumber Company, with their characteristic enterprise and progressive spirit, have commenced the construction of a railroad from their mammoth lumber mills at Dover, Southward, which will be operated in connection with their mills for logging purposes, and will have a locomotive of its own.

New Bern Journal: Messrs. Blade Bros., the enterprising saw mill property on the banks of the Trent river opposite New Bern, are beginning to build a railroad through a portion of their standing timber in Jones county, the terminus of the road to be two miles below Trenton. The road when first built is to be six miles in length, but may be extended as deemed.
