FOR TOBACCO GROWERS.

The Weather Bureau Proposes a System of Frost Warnings for Their Benefit. OFFICE U. S. WEATHER BUREAU,

RALEIGH, N. C., September, 1891. To the Tobacco Growers of North Caro

The Chief of the U.S. Weather Bu reau is about to perfect a system of frost warnings for the benefit of the tobacco growers in this State. The coldwave flag (white flag, square with black center) will be the frost warning symbol, and display stations wherever a dis-

playman (preferably a tobacco grower or some disinterested person) can be secured who will purchase or make his own flag and display it from a tall staff for the benefit of the community or section. Bulleting the information, utilizing the press, railroad wires, telephones, etc., will form part of the general plan of giving these warnings to the people of the several counties where tobacco is
