

FIGHTING FACTIONS.

The dispatches of Saturday announce a rupture of the Farmer's Alliance of Iowa, and the organization of a new Alliance in opposition to the old one. The faction which has organized this new Alliance is led by boomers of the People's Party, from which it seems that politics is at the bottom of the trouble. The dispatch further informs us that "the fight between the two Alliances will henceforth be hot."

There is nothing surprising in this to those who have kept track of the Alliance movement since it has begun to tangle up in politics. There are rival factions in Kansas, in Missouri, in Iowa, in Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi and South Carolina. These have not all taken on the organized shape as in Iowa, but they will if the political departure be forced, for there are Alliance men, and lots of them, who from the beginning have deprecated and protested against making the Alliance directly or indirectly the annex of any political party. But there are others, like Senator Pfeffer and Representative Simpson, who act on the presumption that this is what the Alliance was organized for, to elect them and cute, thrifty gentlemen like them to office.

When politics was first injected into the Alliance we predicted that if this new departure was encouraged it would result eventually in the destruction of the Alliance. We gave reasons for entertaining this belief. As a non-political organization, pursung the objects for which it was originated, it might and would last for many years, and embrace within it a large majority of the farmers of also been the block tin used. 
