SPILKS TURPENTINE.

—Durham Sun: Mrs. Tamar Manning Battle, wife of Mr. Gaston Battle, of Rocky Mount, died this morning at the home of her parents at Chapel Hill. She was a sister of Dr. J. M. Manning and Mr. J. S. Manning, of this city.

—Raleigh News and Observer: On Sunday afternoon a white lad named Brut received a terrible kick from a mule in the lot adjoining Mr. Ed. Lee's stable, on Wilmington street. His jaw was broken, and eight of his teeth were kicked out.

—Lumberton Robesonian: It is our deliberate opinion that the crops on the Lumberton & Carthage road, in Robeson county, are the best we have noticed in the last twenty years. This applies to cotton which is well fruited as to corn. It is the general opinion that the crops in Robeson are better than in any of the surrounding counties.

—Ashville Citizen: Buncombe county criminal court convened this morning at 10 o'clock. After Judge H. Bascom Carter had charged the grand jury, the court took up the case against Robert Dougherty, for killing Wm. Torrence. A verdict of manslaughter was agreed on between Solicitor Carter and the counsel for the defense. Judge Carter then went into the examination of the case, to determine the sentence to be put on Dougherty. Just before 4 o'clock Judge Carter sentenced the prisoner to twenty years in the penitentiary.

—Greensboro Record: Newell & Tucker's store was burglarized Saturday night by experts. An attempt was made to reach the lock on the lower front door by boring. Nine holes were bored without success; but when the upper front door was bored, the auger struck the "bull's eye" the first time, and the lock yielded to the pressure. The money drawers were prized off, but only a few cents were obtained.

—Thomas H. Henley, a man far advanced in years, died on the sleeper this morning just this side of Charlotte. He was traveling alone and had a ticket to High Point, at which point his unconfined remains were delivered at 11 a. m. to-day. All we could learn was that he was a native of Randolph county and had a ticket from some point in Texas.

—Charlotte News: Mr. Robert C. McGinnis died at his home in this city, at 9 o'clock yesterday morning. He had been sick for a long time with Bright's disease. Mr. McGinnis was a brother to Mr. E. D. McGinnis and was about 58 years of age. —About four months ago Mr. Robert McInon, an engineer on the C. & A. Railroad, was bitten by a mad dog. He went to New York and submitted to the Pasteur treatment. The treatment was completed, and paying \$250 for it, Mr. McInon left the Institute with the guarantee that he was cured, and indeed he felt that the treatment had been a perfect success. On returning to his home in Columbia he enjoyed good health until within a few days past, when symptoms of hydrophobia manifested themselves. He grew rapidly worse, and died yesterday morning at 9 o'clock. The physicians who treated him said that there could be no mistaking his malady. It was a genuine form of hydrophobia.

—Lenoir Topic: A direct telegraph line has been erected between Lenoir and Lancaster. S. C. A telegraph office has been established at Granite Falls. —A correspondent tells of two boys, 16 and 18 years of age, who attended Robinson's show at Morganton, and who never before had been "half a mile from home, had never been to preaching, had never seen a minister, had never been to a free school, had never been to Sunday School, and had never gone counting out. The possibilities of this country as a beef-ripping, and its ability to feed the whole Southern country with beef, are not half known. Mr. W. W.
