SPIRITS TURPENTINE.
-Raleigh News and Observer:
Seventy-seven convicts were brought
down to the penitentiary yesterday from
Cherokee county, where they have been
working on the Ducktown railroad.

Greensboro Record: A gentle-
man representing a New England barrel
factory is negotiating for the location of a
stave factory in Greensboro. The same
firm will also manufacture tobacco boxes
on a large scale.
Murfreesboro Index: Mr. W. D.
Downs, of Ashokie, last week shot and
killed a bald eagle with a twenty-two
calibre rifle at a distance of 300 feet.

Salisbury Herald: The firm of
H. S. L. Wright, clothing dealers, closed
their store at 10 o'clock this morning
and made an assignment to Hon. Lee S.
Overman and Mr. L. H. Clement. The
assets of the store are about \$12,000 and
\$13,000, and liabilities about \$10,000.
-Newtown Enterprise: Mr. Cicero
Cline tells us that he had a pumpkin
vine in his garden which had on it 43
pumpkins. The largest in the lot
weighed 27 pounds and the smallest 19
pounds; 30 of them averaged 35 pounds
each, and the other 13 averaged 15

ing, of Hester, has yet on hand some of
his crop of tobacco raised in 1889 sound
and all right.

business people of Tipton, a growing
town in the southern portion of Geor-
gia, Saturday presented Capt. W. H.
Snow a deed to a four thousand dollar
farm and a town residence as an induc-
ement to have him locate there and grow
tobacco, carrying out his modern ideas.
The proposition was accepted, and a
market will be established at Tipton
next summer and factories started.
