—Durham Sun: Mrs. R. A. Parrish, relict of the late Col. D. C. Parrish, died last night about 10:30 o'clock, at the home of her son, Capt. E. J. Parrish, on Dilard street. She was in her 74th year.

—Newbern Journal: Mr. F. J. Hardison finished a bored well yesterday for Dr. N. H. Street which will supply water for his two houses adjoining Centenary M. E. Church. The well is 50 feet deep—16 feet being through solid rock and ending in sand and gravel at the bottom, from which source an abundance of excellent water is obtained.

—Raleigh Chronicle: The Supreme Court Wednesday adjourned for the term. —Wages loaded with cotton seed were here by the score yesterday. The owners said they had disposed of nearly all their cotton.

—Chatham Record: The revenue officers made a raid in this county on last Friday night and captured about three miles north of this place, twelve or fifteen hundred gallons of "beer" which was just ready to be made into blockade whiskey.

—Monroe Register: The Hessian fly is doing considerable damage to the small grain in Lane's Creek township.
