





Beat the whites of 4 eggs to a stiff froth; place them carefully in a vessel containing a pint of boiling milk; let them remain until set; then carefully remove to a plate. Beat the 4 yolks and a cup of sugar until light; stir in half cup of sweet milk, pour slowly into the boiling milk, stiring briskly all the while. Continue stirring and let it remain on the fire long enough to thicken, taking care that it never boils, or it will be unfit for use. Flavor to suit the taste. Place slices of any cake in dessert plates; pour the custard over them; put a spoonful of the whites on each piece of cake and a drop of jelly in the center.
