This morning Senator Pritchard, Congressman Richmond Pearson, John B. Eaves, H. L. Grant, B. Lusk, M. L Mott, S. H. Buchanan and a number of other prominent Republicans arrived

Mr. James E. Boyd was the third o the Republican Gabernatorial candidates to arrive in the city. This gentleman came yesterday afternoon and his friends say that he is the man of the hour. Mr. Boyd certainly holds a unique position. He is accredited with thirty votes and if there is no election after several ballots have been taken, the Greensboro man will bear watching. Mr. Boyd was approached by your correspondent and he talked interestingly of the situation. 
