

RA LROAD RATE WAR.

Negotiations for Figal Settlement of the Trouble Between the Southern and the S. A. L.

By Telegraph to the Moraing Star. BALTIMORE. August 14 -It is understood that negotiations for the settlement of the Southern Railway and Seaboard Air Line trouble have made considerable progress This is not officially admitted, but interests outside of the

Seaboard Air Line and the Southern Railway are striving to bring about an understanding which will prevent the renewal of hostilities after the hear ng before Judge Simonton to-morrow. It is reasonably certain that if an agreement is not reached the Seaboard Air Line will find ways and means of cutting into the revenue of the Southern Railway and this in turn will be felt by other roads. The Pennsylvania is understood to have taken a hand in the effort to get a settlement and its influence with both lines is necessarily considerable. As matters now stand there is a deadlock in hostilities, the breaking of which may be full of significance and is waited with


