ORIENTAL SALUTES

Onee and Amusing Ways People of the East Greet One Another

The people of the orient salute each other in many queer and amusing ways. One of them is called the salam, or salam, which is a very low, accompanied by a horizontal movement of the arms toward the person saluted until the extended hands meet edge to edge. Another form is a low bow, with the palm of the right hand to the brow. In Persia the subject salutes the monarch by throwing himself on the ground and kissing his feet.

In China, an inferior on horseback, on meeting a superior, dismounts and waits until the superior has passed. In Japan an inferior removes his sandals when he meets a superior, places his right hand in his left sleeve, then crosses his arms, and bowing himself to and fro. "Don't burst me!" Don't burst me!

The Chinese very funny fashion in Sam. When an inferior comes into the presence of a superior, he throws himself upon the ground. Then the superior sends one of his attendants forward to see whether the prostrate man has been eating anything or has any offensive odor about him. If he has, the attendant raises him from the ground, but if he is guilty, the attendant straightway kicks him on the ground and kisses his feet.

Some of the Indian tribes have a way of saluting each other by rubbing their noses together. This is also the form in the Friendly Islands, where the man to be saluted takes the other's hand and rubs it upon his own nose and mouth. In the Arabian states, guests or acquaintances are saluted by the rubbing of their hands together. In Turkey the salute is to place the hand upon the breast and bow, which is both graceful and appropriate.

In Burma, when a man meets a woman, he puts his nose and his mouth close to hers, and inhales her breath. He does not kiss her cheek, strange to say. A man coming into the presence of another man in the great part of Germany it is considered an act of politeness, not of gallantry, for a man to place his hand on the arm of the other. This salute is also given to near relatives, while in Russia it is extended to kissing the forehead.

The Arabian salutation, hands clasped together, the men of Persia have a custom that would seem queer, not to say laughable, here. They greet each other with the thumbs of their right hands, held together, and rub them together. This salute is said to be an imitation of the salute of the prophet Mohammed, who is said to have been saluted in this way.
