CRIMINAL COURT.

Case Against George Johnson for Crimina Assault Continued to Next Term-The Styron-Thompson Case to be Tried To-day.

The Criminal Court will adjourn sine die this morning at 11 o'clock.

Court yesterday morning convened at o'clock and the case against Henry Styron and Fletcher Thompson, charged with sending in a false alarm of fire, the trial of which commenced the day before, was called. Ino. D. Bellamy, Esq.! one of the

counsel for the defence, addressing the Court, made motion for the proceedings to be quashed, as the statute under which the defendants were indicted (chapter 408. Public Laws of North Carolina of 1893) was framed in the following words: that any person or persons wilfully and wantonly sending, etc.," while in the bill of indictment the word "unlawfully" ap-

> Marsden Bellamy, Esq., counsel, representing Solicitor Richardson in the prosecution, stated that he had noticed the defect in the bill of indictment, and ntended asking the Court's permission to amend it.

Judge Sutton stated that he, too, had noticed the defect, and as the counsel for the defence had moved to quash the proceedings, he would do so, but would hold the prisoners until another bill of indictment could be prepared and sent to the grand jury. His Honor further stated that unless the bill was prepared and submitted to the grand jury before they adjourned for the term that he would take the two defendants' personal recognizances for their appearance at the next regular term of the Court. Marsden Bellamy, Esq., however, as-

sured the Court that the bill of indictment would be immediately drawn. Geo. Johason, charged with criminal assault, was next arraigned, to be tried for his life. Solicitor Richardson stated that the State was not ready to go to trial, as several witnesses had to be summoned from Sampson county, and he would therefore ask for a continuance

of the case until next term. The Court

granted the State's request. Wright with perjary. Court at 715 o'clock took a recess until 9 30 o'clock this morning. Before adjournment the counsel rep-

resenting Styron and Thompson asked the Court for information in regard tothe trial of the case, as a true bill had been found. Judge Satton replied that the matter would be taken up this morning.
