Agust 13.-Bradstreet's to-morro # will say : Evidences of wideapread revival in demand for merchandise and other products have become so sumerous as to compel general recognition. The press have, therefore, cessed discussing whether trade has really improved or not, and have begun

measuring the volume of business compared with preceding periods. A buoyancy of feeling has sporared among buyers and sellers at New York. Baltimore, Chicago, St. Louis and Kansas City, where interior merchants have througed this week, the like of which has not been seen for several years. Interior merchants are buying dry goods, clothing, shoes, groceries and fancy articles far more freely than at any time since 1893. Crop conditions have improved at the South and Southwest, and merchants there are encouraged. Southern lumber mills are not able to keep up with orders, and innumerable small consumers of iron and steel throughout the central Western States are buying raw

material as they have not for years. A nominal advance of 75c a ton for steel billets is more than a feature, as it means the confidence of makers in an early revival of the demand for Iron and steel which has been so long delayed Wheat scored an advance of 7c on continued heavy exports and a tendency to decrease estimates of the suse of the domestic crop. Wool is higher un speculative holding, and corton yarns have advanced again. Hides and Southern lumber are up, as are wheat floor, Indian corn and oats; and last, but not least, print cloths, the market for which has been so long depressed. Prices for sugar, coffee, lard and petroleum remain unchanged, while pork is almost the only important product quoted lower than last week.

There are \$14 business failures reported throughout the United States this week, compared with \$14 last week, 158 is the second week of August, 1896, 195 in the like period in 1995, 233 in 1894 and 309 in the like week of 1893. There are thirty-one business failures reported from the Domisios of Casada this week, against forty one last week, thirty five in the week a year ago and twenty-nine two years ago.

WOODMEN OF AMERICA,

A FREE FIGHT BETWEEN RIVAL PAR-TISANS OF THE ORDER.

The City Marshal of Pulson, Illinoir, Pa tally Hurt and Many Others Injured-Rathroad Track Torn Up-Some of the Bloters Arrested.

By Talagraph to the Morning Star FULTON, ILL., August 18 .- The long standing fight between this town and Rock Island, Ill., for location of the beadquarters of the modern Woodmen ôf America, culminated to-day in a hand-to-hand fight between scores of partisans of the respective towns, in which a number of persons were seriously injured. The contest between the two towns dates back several years and

the courts have been appealed to.

The slow process of law was not satisfactory, so they determined to take matters in their own hands. To-day a party was made up in the city by the Mississippi, and plans were made for a raid on the Fulton beadquarters, with object of forcibly taking possession of the books, records. etc., of the Order and removing the office of head clerk Hawes to Rock Island. A train was chartered, consisting of three coaches, a baggage car and two box cars, and the invaders were on their way to Fulton. The inhabitants of the latter town were forewarned. however and made ready to give their uninvited guests a cordial reception. A fire alarm was sounded, and lines of hose were laid to the points where it was thought the Rock Islanders would be most likely to disembark. The arrival of the special train was the signal for hostilities to begin. There was intense feeling on both sides, and a great variety of weapons, the combination resulting in the following casualties: Will Bennits, city marshal, of Fulton; head cut and believed to be fatally burt; W P Finnagan, head badly cut; James Carrier, head cut. E1. Bare head and arms injured. Chris. Williams.

The free fight lasted for an hour or more, rocks, clubs and missiles of every description being wielded industriously by the organization officers. The Fultonites finally got the better of the fight and Deputy Sheriff Farley efficted the arrest of Head Attorney Johnson, of the Modern Woodmen, one of the Rock Island party, and a number of his companions. The railroad track on each side of the cars that brought the Rock Islanders was torn up by the Fultonites. the latter evidently aiming to cut off the retreat of their enemies. A large force of peace officers has been sworn in, and as the invaders, or most of them, are still in Fulton, there is great difficult in p e venting a renewal of the trouble.

STRIKING MINERS.

Morethee Stopped by Court I | inc't a Narrow E capt from Serious Trouble-

PITTIBURG August 18 - Injunctions by the striking miners against the New York and Cleveland G is Coal Company cipitating sericus trouble. As it was, the first blood of the strike was Heavy Stewart, one of the sheriff's deputies, struck Jacob Mott, a drummer of the McDonald band. with the edge of a brass born and cut a severe gash above his eye. The night of the blood wrought up the 000 idle miners to such a pitch that a desperate cor flict was imminent. The deputies were excited and noisy. The strikers were jeering and yelling and urging a further run down the road. In that cross there were enough angry strikers to assibilate four times the force of officers on the ground. Capt. Bellingham. Sheriff Lowry. Chief Deputy James R chards and Superintendent De Armitt were the only cool men in the assemblage. To them and to Capt. Bellingham belongs the credit of avoiding a riot. When Beilingham saw there was danger of his men getting beyoud his control, he commanded a halt and addressed himself to the task of restraining the more belligerent. So well was his efforts directed that he soon had restored comparative order.

Sheriff Lowry had a difficult task to perform, but he handled it well and by to neutralize the bitterness and strife invited by the behavior of his subordinate. The strikers finally retired and marched back to their camp There were several in the encounter, other brushes with the deputies but no

WHAT THE LOW RAILROAD RATES GOOD FOR FIFTEEN DAYS, ARE DOING FOR NEW YORK.

Pive Thousand Visiting Buyers Expected to Spend Over \$25,000,000 This Week-Buyers Ordering Large Brooke.

[Special to the Baltimore Sun] NEW YORK, August 11.-The merchasts from out of town are still pour ing into this city to purchase their fall stocks, drawn here by the labors of the Merchants' Association. It is believed that during the week at least 5 000 of them will be in the city. Those who have heretofore made their purchases in Chicago, St. Louis and other cities have transferred their patronage to New York on account of the cheap railroad

ares allowed them. The opinion expressed by the out-oftown merchants is practically unanimous that a great wave of prosperity is rapidly approaching. The Western cross are large, and the prices, particularly those of wheat, are putting money into

the pockets of the farmers The Southerners are convinced that the cotton crop will be an unusually fine one, and that the price will be high The settlement of the tariff question has resalted in a renewal of confidence, and money which has been hoarded for years is now coming to the front, locking for investment. The people are buying more, and merchants who have been feeling their way in the past will now put in larger stocks Everything indicates the return of good times in the very near

I is estimated that the 5 000 merchants who will visit New York this week will spend \$35 000 000 for the stocks they will purchase. Their botel bills for five days will amount to \$75,000. and they will probably spend \$100,000. Their payments for freight on goods purchased will amount to \$250,000 and for ratiway fare \$50 000, making a grand total of expenditures for the week of \$35 475 000. The placing of this amount of money in New York at this time can not fail to have a wonderfully good effect

on the business affairs of the city. New York merchants are wondering to themselves why they did not organ a: years ago, as they have done now, to bring trade bere. Their success this year has taught them a lesson which they are not likely to forget in the future.

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
